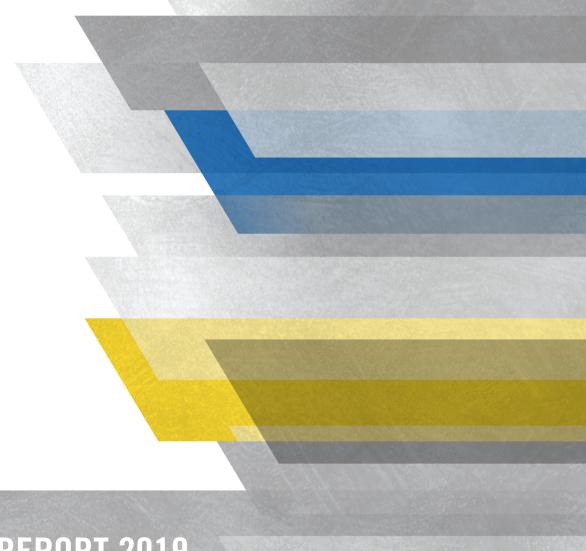

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Dear Shareholders

On behalf of the board of directors of KangLi International Holdings Limited ("KangLi International Holdings" or the "Company") and its subsidiaries (collectively known as the "Group"), I am pleased to present the audited annual report for the year ended 31 December 2019 (the "Year") for shareholders' review.

REVIEW

As a private manufacturer of galvanized steel product in the home appliance sector, we are primarily engaged in the provision of galvanized steel and painted steel to mainly midstream processors and home appliance manufacturers for manufacturing home appliances, the majority of which are white goods including refrigerators and washing machines. In 2019, facing the complexity posed by the augmented risks and challenges at home and abroad, China's economy remained stable in general, despite the decrease in the pace of growth of GDP and consumables. Affected by the sustained downturn of the real estate market, the home appliances industry also experienced a bottleneck period in its development. For white goods, the refrigerator market experienced a period of bumpy rise, with approximately 6.7% growth in retail sales volume and approximately 1.0% growth in retail sales amount during the Year. The market of washing machines was relatively stable in general, with a slight 0.6% drop in retail sales amount and approximately 4.2% rise in retail sales volume. The end-user market was essentially stable, despite the gradual decrease in product prices due to the increasingly fierce competition in the market of galvanized steel products for home appliances, which had impact on the Group's business to a certain extent.

In 2019, the Group's total revenue amounted to approximately RMB1,495,630,000, representing a decrease of approximately 3.4% from approximately RMB1,548,276,000 in 2018. Our total sales volume of cold rolled steel products and galvanized steel products increased by 956 tonnes from 275,286 tonnes in 2018 to 276,242 tonnes in 2019.

In 2019, our gross profit decreased by approximately RMB31,235,000 or 23.9% from approximately RMB130,760,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB99,525,000 in 2019. Gross profit margin decreased from approximately 8.4% in 2018 to approximately 6.7% in 2019.

The utilization rate of our painted steel production line had been on the rise and essentially reached full capacity at the end of 2019. There was growth in our painted steel business. We have postponed our capacity expansion plan due to the change of planned uses in respect of the land parcels that we had identified. We are now looking for alternatives to kick off our capacity expansion plan as soon as practicable.

PROSPECTS

The Central Economic Work Conference held at the end of 2019 stressed "the holistic implementation of city-specific policies and the long-lasting austerity mechanism for stabilizing land prices, property prices and expectations, and fostering the steady and healthy development of the real estate market". Austerity measures on the real estate industry were not slackened, while some gradual slowdown was noted. The steady development of the real estate market is good to the demand for home appliances. Since June 2019, a number of policies were introduced in the PRC to boost demand in various industries such as automobile, home appliances, consumer electronics products and so forth, and to facilitate the recycling and rejuvenation of home appliances as well as the elimination of products with high power consumption. Meanwhile, with the promotion of 5G technology and the growth in demand for non-conventional rigid-demand products such as dishwashers and tumble dryers, it is anticipated that the home appliances market will see new momentum for growth.

The Group will strive for long-term steady development and seek further expansion of its market share by engaging in active communication with local governments, identifying suitable land parcels and expediting its capacity expansion plan.

The COVID-19 pandemic in early 2020 spread across the PRC and the world at large and will likely cause substantial impact on economic development. To mitigate the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on businesses, the PRC government has launched various policies to ease the financial burden on businesses. We believe that we can win this battle against epidemic and resume normal production and operation in the near future.

The Group has been closely monitoring the impact of the developments on the Group's businesses and has put in place contingency measures. As far as the Group's businesses are concerned, the COVID-19 pandemic may cause production and delivery delays of the Group's steel products, but the directors of the Company consider that such impact is temporary and could be reduced by expediting production upon cessation of the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic may also significantly impact the demand of the Group's steel products which in turn may result in the decrease in sales of such products, and hence the profitability of the Group's operations and the potential impairment of the Group's production facilities in future periods. Such possible decrease in the demand of the Group's products may be a result of the customers' deteriorating operations which may increase the impairment risks of related debtors in future periods.

APPRECIATION

I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to our shareholders, investors and business partners for their trust and support. My gratitude also goes to all of our Board members, the senior management and the employees for their hard work and contribution to the Group. Going forward, we will endeavour to carry on with the Group's development and seek stable return to the shareholders.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

BUSINESS REVIEW

The Group is a leading midstream galvanized steel products manufacturer in the home appliance sector in Jiangsu Province, the PRC. The Group primarily engaged in the production and sales of cold rolled steel products, unpainted galvanized steel products and painted galvanized steel products to mainly midstream steel product processors for further processing and to home appliance manufacturers for production of home appliances such as refrigerators, washing machines and ovens. The Group has the production capability of pickled rolls, cold-rolled steel, unpainted galvanized steel and painted galvanized steel products along the whole industry chain.

For the year ended 31 December 2019, the Group recorded a revenue amounting to approximately RMB1,495,630,000, a decrease of approximately 3.4% compared with that of the corresponding period in 2018.

For the year ended 31 December 2019, the sales volume of our cold rolled steel products and galvanized steel products totalled 276,242 tonnes, representing an increase of 956 tonnes or approximately 0.3% compared with 275,286 tonnes for the year ended 31 December 2018. During the review period, the sales volume of our cold rolled steel products and galvanized steel products were 20,843 tonnes and 255,399 tonnes respectively, and among the latter, the sales volume of our unpainted galvanized steel products and painted galvanized steel products were 189,715 tonnes and 65,684 tonnes respectively. Under fierce market competition, the year saw a remarkable decrease in both the sales volume and average selling price of unpainted galvanized steel products. The sales volume of unpainted galvanized steel products dropped from 213,611 tonnes in the year ended 31 December 2018 by 23,896 tonnes or approximately 11.2% to 189,715 tonnes in 2019. As regards painted galvanized steel products, the sales volume increased from 43,201 tonnes in the year ended 31 December 2018 by 22,483 tonnes or approximately 52.0% to 65,684 tonnes in 2019. Our total sales volume for the year ended 31 December 2019 remained relatively stable.

As the utilization of our painted galvanized steel production line was yet to reach its maximum capacity in early 2019, we geared up our efforts on boosting sales and took up additional sales orders for our painted galvanized steel products, which had led to the substantial increase in the sales volume of our painted galvanized steel products.

In 2019, with our dedication to the research and enhancement of craftsmanship, we submitted application for 9 utility model patents. By enhancing techniques and craftsmanship, we managed to uplift our production efficiency, reduce losses during production processes, and in turn lower the relevant costs of our products.

Revenue

Revenue of the Group is primarily generated from the sale of hard steel coil and hot-dip galvanized steel products. For the year ended 31 December 2019, the total revenue of the Group amounted to approximately RMB1,495,630,000, representing a decrease of approximately 3.4% from approximately RMB1,548,276,000 in the year ended 31 December 2018. During the year, the average selling price of the Group's hard steel coil and galvanized steel products decreased by approximately 5% to 7% as compared to the previous year, whilst the decrease in total revenue was relatively mild under the Group's efforts in adjusting the product mix for sale.

An analysis of the Group's revenue, sales volume and average selling price by products in 2019 and 2018 is as follows:

Gross profit and gross profit margin

For the year ended 31 December 2019, gross profit of the Group amounted to approximately RMB99,525,000 (2018: approximately RMB130,760,000). Overall gross profit margin decreased from approximately 8.4% in 2018 to approximately 6.7% in 2019. An analysis of the Group's gross profit, proportion of total gross profit and gross profit margin by products in 2019 and 2018 is as follows:

A decrease in the overall gross profit margin of the Group was mainly the result of the more remarkable drop in average selling price of products than the drop in average raw material prices for the Group's products. The Company will strengthen the expectation management of market price of steel.

Other income

Other income of the Group amounted to approximately RMB5,069,000 in 2019, representing an increase of approximately RMB975,000 from approximately RMB4,094,000 in 2018. The increase was mainly attributable to an increase in interest income and net foreign exchange gain.

Selling expenses

Selling and distribution expenses of the Group increased from approximately RMB39,871,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB42,288,000 in 2019. The increase was mainly due to the increase in transportation expenses and business hospitality expenses of the Group.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses of the Group increased from approximately RMB15,824,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB17,409,000 in 2019. The increase was mainly due to the increase in consultancy services fee and staff costs.

Finance costs

Finance costs of the Group increased from approximately RMB15,139,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB21,428,000 in 2019. The increase was mainly due to the increase in acceptance discounted interest.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Profit before taxation

Profit before taxation of the Group decreased from approximately RMB44,655,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB23,469,000 in 2019.

Income tax

Tax credits of approximately RMB1,229,000 and approximately RMB6,266,000 recorded for the year ended 31 December 2019 and 2018 respectively were mainly due to reverse of deferred tax resulted from timing differences and change in tax rate. The significant tax credit recorded in 2018 was due to an operating subsidiary of the Company having obtained the status of High-tech Enterprise in November 2018. That subsidiary is entitled to a preferential tax rate of 15% from 2018 to 2020 and an additional tax deductible allowance on qualified research and development costs incurred.

Profit for the year

As a result of the foregoing, profit for the year of the Group decreased from approximately RMB50,921,000 in 2018 to approximately RMB24,698,000 in 2019. Net profit margin of the Group decreased from approximately 3.3% in 2018 to approximately 1.7% in 2019. The return on equity, calculated by dividing net profit for the year by total equity at the end of the year, as at 31 December 2019, was approximately 4.0% (2018: 8.5%).

Liquidity and financial resources

As at 31 December 2019, the Group had approximately RMB184,216,000 (2018: RMB154,625,000) cash at bank and on hand. As at 31 December 2019, the restricted deposit placed at banks as collaterals for bills issued by the Group amounted to approximately RMB53,600,000 (2018: RMB9,685,000), representing an increase of approximately 4.5 times. The substantial increase was attributable to the increase in the deposit for notes payable.

Net current asset

The Group recorded net current assets of approximately RMB361,912,000 as at 31 December 2019, representing an increase of approximately 16.1% as compared with approximately RMB311,804,000 as of 31 December 2018. The current ratio, calculated by dividing the current assets by current liabilities, was approximately 1.5 as of 31 December 2019 (2018: 1.4). The net current asset and current ratio in 2019 and 2018 were comparable and remained healthy.

Borrowings and pledge of assets

As at 31 December 2019, the Group had bank borrowings amounting to approximately RMB329,769,000 (2018: RMB286,000,000), of which approximately RMB53,000,000 was secured by the Group's plant and equipment and approximately RMB129,769,000 was secured by bills receivables. All borrowings shall be repayable within one year.

The Group's gearing ratio, calculated by dividing total borrowings which include all interest-bearing loans and amounts due to related parties under accrued expenses and other payables by total equity of the Group, was approximately 0.6 and 0.5 as at 31 December 2019 and 2018 respectively.

Capital structure

The Company's capital comprises ordinary shares and capital reserves. The Group finances its working capital, capital expenditures and other liquidity requirements through a combination of its cash and cash equivalents, cash flows generated from operations, bank facilities, and net proceeds from the initial public offering of the Company.

Contingent liabilities

As at 31 December 2019, the Group did not have any material contingent liabilities.

Financial risks

The Group is exposed to various financial risks, including foreign currency risk, interest rate risk and credit risk in the normal course of its business.

Foreign currency risk

Most of the Group's businesses are settled in Renminbi. However, the Group's sales to overseas customers are settled in foreign currencies. In 2019, approximately 95.6% of the Group's revenue was settled in Renminbi and approximately 4.4% was settled in foreign currencies.

Exchange rate fluctuations will affect sales revenue settled in foreign currencies, which in turn may have adverse effects on the Group. The Group does not hedge against foreign currency risk by using any derivative contracts. The management of the Group manages its foreign currency risk by closely monitoring the movement of the foreign currency rates and considering hedging significant foreign currency risk should the need arise.

Interest rate risk

The Group's interest rate risks primarily arise from fixed rate bank deposits and borrowings. The Group currently does not use any derivative contracts to hedge against its interest rate risks.

Credit risk

The Group's credit risks primarily arise from trade and other receivables.

MATERIAL ACQUISITIONS AND DISPOSALS OF SUBSIDIARIES AND ASSOCIATED COMPANIES

The Group did not have material acquisitions and disposals of subsidiaries and associated companies for the year ended 31 December 2019.

EMPLOYEES AND REMUNERATION POLICIES

As at 31 December 2019, the Group had 556 employees, including executive Directors. The employees' salaries are reviewed and adjusted annually based on their performance and experience. The Group's employee benefits include performance bonus, medical insurance, mandatory provident fund scheme, local municipal government retirement scheme and education subsidy to encourage continuous professional development of staff.

BIOGRAPHICAL DETAILS OF THE DIRECTORS AND SENIOR MANAGEMENT

DIRECTORS

Executive Directors

Mr. Mei Zefeng (梅澤鋒先生), aged 42, was appointed as our executive Director on 21 December 2017.

Mr. Mei graduated from Nanjing University (南京大學), the PRC in July 2000 with a undergraduate diploma in Electronic Engineering. He also obtained a postgraduate diploma of marketing management from University of Derby, the United Kingdom in November 2004. As a founder of our Group, Mr. Mei had been serving as the general manager and an executive director of Jiangnan Precision from July 2003 to December 2007 and from July 2003 to September 2017, respectively. He has been appointed as the chairman of Jiangnan Precision since October 2017. Mr. Mei has been primarily responsible for overall strategic planning, operations and management of our Group.

Mr. Mei has over 17 years of experience in the steel processing industry. He has been serving as the chairman of Jiangnan Industrial Group since January 2007. He has been appointed as the supervisor of Jiangnan Rural Commercial Bank (江南農村商業銀行), a company principally engages in banking and financial services since January 2010. Mr. Mei received numerous awards in the past including "Outstanding Entrepreneur" of Wujin District (武進區"優秀企業家"), Star Industrial Entrepreneur of Changzhou City (常州市工業明星企業家) and Top 10 Outstanding Young Entrepreneur of Jiangsu Province (江蘇省十大傑出青年企業家).

Mr. Mei is the spouse of Ms. Liu, Chairman of the Company, the cousin-in-law of Mr. Xu, an executive director, and the cousin-in-law of Mr. Liu Yu, head of material procurement of the Group.

Ms. Liu Ping (劉萍女士), aged 40, is our Chairman and was appointed as our executive Director on 21 December 2017. She is also the chairman of the Nomination Committee.

Ms. Liu graduated from Jinling Vocational Institute (金陵職業大學) (currently known as Jinling Institute of Technology (金陵科技學院)), the PRC in July 2001 with a diploma in Business Administration. She further obtained a bachelor's degree of Business (International Business) from Queensland University of Technology, Australia in 2004. Ms. Liu joined our Group in October 2005 and served as the chief financial officer of Jiangnan Precision from October 2005 to September 2009. She has been appointed as the president of Jiangnan Precision since October 2009. Ms. Liu has been primarily responsible for overall operations and management of our Group. Ms. Liu has over 14 years of experience in financial control and enterprise management.

Ms. Liu is the spouse of Mr. Mei, the cousin of each of Mr. Xu Chao, an executive director, and Mr. Liu Yu, head of material procurement of the Group.

Mr. Zhang Zhihong (張志洪先生), aged 48, is our Chief Executive Officer and was appointed as our executive Director on 18 May 2018. He is also a member of the Remuneration Committee.

Mr. Zhang graduated from Shandong Continuing Education College of Technology (山東科技進修學院), the PRC with a degree in Industrial Electrification Technology (工業電氣化技術) in July 2011 through distance learning. Mr. Zhang joined our Group in May 2007 and served as the vice president of production and the head of procurement of Jiangnan Precision from May 2007 to July 2012 and from July 2012 to June 2014, respectively. He has been the general manager of Jiangnan Precision since June 2014 and is currently a director of Jiangnan Precision. Mr. Zhang is mainly responsible for production and operations management of our Group.

Mr. Zhang has over 20 years of experience in production and operations management in plastic and aluminium profile industry. Prior to joining our Group, Mr. Zhang worked as the factory manager in Jiangnan Chuangjia from January 1999 to June 2002. He also worked as the factory manager in Changzhou Huacai Construction Material Co., Limited (常州華彩建材有限公司), a company principally engages in production and sales of aluminium alloy profile, from July 2002 to April 2007.

Ms. Lu Xiaoyu (陸小玉女士), aged 44, was appointed as our executive Director on 18 May 2018 and appointed as the Financial Controller of the Group on 1 January 2020.

Ms. Lu was awarded a bachelor's degree in Currency and Banking (貨幣銀行) from Nanjing Agricultural University (南京農業大學), the PRC in July 1999. Ms. Lu joined our Group in January 2005 as the manager of finance department (財務科長) of Jiangnan Precision and became the chief financial officer (財務總監) of Jiangnan Precision in January 2017. Ms. Lu is mainly responsible for overall financial management of our Group.

Prior to joining our Group, Ms. Lu worked as a cashier in Jiangnan Industrial Group from September 1999 to December 2004.

Mr. Xu Chao (許潮先生), aged 32, was appointed as our executive Director of our Company on 18 May 2018.

Mr. Xu was awarded a bachelor's degree in Technology and Instrument of Measurement and Control (測控技術與儀器) from Nanjing Normal University (南京師範大學), the PRC in July 2010. Mr. Xu joined Jiangnan Precision in September 2010 as a clerk at the human resources department. Mr. Xu was the head of sales of Jiangnan Precision from July 2011 to July 2017. He has been appointed as the secretary of the board of directors and assistant general manager of Jiangnan Precision since August 2017. Mr. Xu is mainly responsible for general administration of our Group.

He is the cousin of Ms. Liu, Chairman of the Company, and the cousin-in-law of Mr. Mei (an executive director of the Company).

Biographical Details of the Directors and Senior Management

Independent non-executive Directors

Mr. Li Yuen Fai Roger (李苑輝先生), aged 59, was appointed as our independent non-executive Director on 25 October 2018. Mr. Li is the chairman of the Audit Committee and a member of the Remuneration Committee and the Nomination Committee.

Mr. Li completed his secondary education in 1980. Mr. Li is an associate member of The Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants, an associate of (i) the Taxation Institute of Hong Kong; (ii) The Society of Chinese Accountants & Auditor; and (iii) The Association of Chartered Certified Accountants. Mr. Li has over 30 years' experience in corporate finance, accounting, auditing, corporate administration and business development. From July 1980 to June 1990, Mr. Li worked for Coopers & Lybrand, an international certified public accounting firm, and was responsible for the auditing and investigation assignments. In November 1991, Mr. Li joined as the partner of William Lui & Company. Since 2003, Mr. Li has been the sole practitioner for Roger Li & Co, a certified public accounting firm in Hong Kong.

Mr. Li was elected a committee member of the 9th and 10th Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference of Heilongjiang Province in the PRC. He was appointed as an economic advisor of the People's Government of Chengde City of Hebei Province in the PRC in 1997.

Since July 2016, Mr. Li has served as an independent non-executive director of 361 Degrees International Co., Limited (stock code: 1361), a company listed on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange").

Mr. Cao Baozhong (曹寶忠先生), aged 78, was appointed as our independent non-executive Director on 25 October 2018. Mr. Cao is the chairman of the Remuneration Committee and a member of the Audit Committee and Nomination Committee.

Mr. Cao obtained a graduation certificate in Market Economy Features and Development Trends (市場經濟特色和發展趨勢) from the Chinese Academy of Governance in 1997.

Mr. Cao has over 42 years of working experience, of which over 20 years focusing on administration and human resources management and his last position was the general manager of Nam Tung (Macau) Investment Ltd. (Bank of China Macau Branch) (澳門南通信托投資有限公司 (中國銀行澳門分行)) until October 2002.

Mr. Yang Guang (楊廣先生), aged 79, was appointed as our independent non-executive Director on 25 October 2018. Mr. Yang is also a member of the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee and Nomination Committee.

Mr. Yang completed a 5-year undergraduate professional programme in Shanghai Jiao Tong University (上海交通大學) in July 1963. Mr. Yang was appointed as an expert of the expert committee of China International Engineering Consultation Company (中國國際工程諮詢公司) in September 2006. Mr. Yang is a professor-level senior engineer (教授級高級工程師) in the PRC.

Mr. Yang has over 22 years of experience in steel manufacturing and processing industry. From May 1979 to May 1991, Mr. Yang worked in Shanghai Baosteel Hot Rolled Factory (上海寶鋼熱軋廠) and his last position was factory manager. Then, Mr. Yang joined Baosteel Group Corporation (寶鋼集團) in May 1991. From May 1991 to February 1993, Mr. Yang worked as director of production department (生產部部長) for overall production management and from February 1993 to May 2001, he worked as deputy general commander of project headquarters (工程指揮部) for planning, design and importation of overseas technology and equipment.

SENIOR MANAGEMENT

Mr. Guo Zhongyi (過中毅先生**)**, aged 47, has been serving as the vice president of production of Jiangnan Precision since August 2016. Mr. Guo is mainly responsible for production management of our Group.

Mr. Guo graduated from Changzhou Institute of Technology (常州工業技術學院), the PRC with a diploma in Machinery Manufacturing and Technology in July 1995. Mr. Guo joined our Group in August 2004 as the production officer of Jiangnan Precision from August 2004 to July 2007. He had served as the supervisor of galvanization workshop and the factory manager of production of Jiangnan Precision from August 2007 to July 2013 and from August 2013 to July 2016, respectively.

Mr. Guo has over 24 years of experience in the manufacturing industry, and prior to joining our Group he had extensive working experience in product design and development and production management.

Mr. Wu Xiaojun (吳曉俊先生), aged 46, has been the vice president of sales and the supervisor of sales department of Jiangsu Province at Jiangnan Precision since August 2016. Mr. Wu is mainly responsible for sales strategies and management of our Group.

Mr. Wu graduated from Wujin County Hutang Vocational School (武進縣湖塘職業中學), the PRC with a high school diploma in Machinery in July 1993. Mr. Wu joined our Group in July 2006 and served as Jiangnan Precision's sales representative of Guangdong region from July 2006 to March 2011. He was a supervisor of sales department in Jiangsu region of Jiangnan Precision from March 2011 to July 2016.

Mr. Wu has over 22 years of experience in the manufacturing industry, and prior to joining our Group, he had extensive working experience in production management, material procurement and product sales.

Mr. Liu Yu (劉宇先生), aged 32, has been serving as the head of procurement of material of Jiangnan Precision since January 2017 and is mainly responsible for our Group's material procurement and management.

Mr. Liu graduated from Huaiyin Normal University (淮陰師範學院), the PRC with a undergraduate diploma of Social Work in June 2010. Mr. Liu joined our Group in September 2010 as a technician of Jiangnan Precision. He served as the sales representative of Jiangnan Precision from March 2011 to August 2016 and later served as a buyer at the material procurement department of Jiangnan Precision from August 2016 to December 2016.

He is the cousin of Ms. Liu and the cousin-in-law of Mr. Mei.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The board (the "Board") of directors (the "Directors") of KangLi International Holdings Limited (the "Company") is pleased to present this report together with the audited consolidated financial statements of the Company and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the "Group") for the year ended 31 December 2019.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The Group is principally engaged in production and sales of (i) unpainted and painted galvanized steel products to midstream steel product processors; and (ii) cold rolled steel products to home appliance manufacturers. The activities of the principal subsidiaries are set out in note 12 to the consolidated financial statements. There were no significant changes in the nature of the Group's activities during the year.

A review of the business of the Group during the year ended 31 December 2019, including an analysis of the Group's performance during the year using financial key performance indicators and an indication of likely future developments in the Group's business are set out under the sections headed "Chairman's Statement" and "Management Discussion and Analysis" in this annual report. This discussion forms part of this Directors' Report.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The business operations and results of the Group may be affected by various factors, some of which are external causes and some are inherent to the business. The Board is aware that the Group is exposed to various risks and the principal risks and uncertainties are summarised below:

1. Risk of uncertain demand for our products

Our products are primarily sold to home appliance manufacturers for production of their end products and midstream steel product processors, which majority of them do not possess of the ability to perform hot-dip galvanization, for further processing into unpainted galvanized steel products in sheet form and painted galvanized steel products. Demand for the end products such as refrigerators, washing machines and ovens manufactured and sold by our customers to the end users drive demand for our cold rolled steel products while frequent end product upgrades and innovation in the home appliance industry propel end users' demand for new products.

However, the sales of the end products manufactured and sold by our customers, which means the demand of our products, depends mainly on global economic environment, especially the trade war between the US and the PRC, China's real estate market and government policies in relation to the promotion of the home appliance industry as well as the pace of introduction of new products in the home appliance industry.

To cope with the risk, in addition to maintaining long term business relationships with most of its major customers, the Group commits to offering high quality products with strong production know-how to increase its competitiveness if the market slowdown.

2. Price fluctuation risk of raw materials

Hot rolled steel coils is the major direct raw materials for the production of the Group. The purchase price of hot rolled steel coils is affected by policies and economic situation.

To cope with the risk, the Group adopts a "cost-plus" pricing model whereby price quotations provided to our customers are reflective of our cost of production together with a mark-up. The extent of mark-up is determined with reference to, amongst others, the market demand, anticipated market trends, historical sales data, fluctuations of the raw materials price, current number of purchase orders, production capacity, the amount of the customer's purchase order, our relationship with the customer and the prices of our competitors' products. Further, we usually place back-to-back orders to suppliers upon receipt of orders from our customers.

3. Risk of shortage of supply of raw materials

Hot rolled steel coils are the most important raw materials for our production. Reliable and stable supply of steel raw materials is crucial to our business operations. If there is any interruption or shortage of supply of any of our hot rolled steel coils, we may not be able to meet the demands of our customers in a timely manner.

To cope with the risk, the Group maintains long term business relationships with most of its major suppliers. Besides, the procurement team of the Group continues to identify alternative suppliers for high quality raw materials in order to ensure the supply of raw materials for production will not be affected.

4. Risks of stringent environmental laws and regulations

The Group are subject to various national and local PRC environmental laws and regulations which impose standards on the emission and treatment of pollutants created during our production process, and are required to obtain environmental protection assessment approval and acceptance such as the Pollutant Discharge License from the relevant PRC Government authorities for the operation of our production facility. As PRC is experiencing substantial issues with environmental pollution, environmental laws and regulations may become more stringent over time. As a result, we may incur more costs and devote more resources to be in full compliance with these laws and regulations.

To cope with the risk, the Group will closely monitor the development of the relevant laws and regulations and consult our PRC legal advisers to ensure compliance with the relevant environmental laws and regulations. Besides, trainings on the relevant environmental protection inspection requirements will be provided to the staff in charge with the assistant of our PRC legal advisers.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Company is committed to maintaining a high standard of corporate governance practices. Information on the corporate governance practices adopted by the Company is set out under the section headed "Corporate Governance Report" of this annual report.

ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE

The Company is committed to fulfilling social responsibility, promoting employee benefits and development, protecting the environment and giving back to community and achieving sustainable growth. Details of such are set out under the section headed "Environmental, Social and Governance Report" of this annual report. This discussion forms part of this Directors' Report.

COMPLIANCE WITH THE RELEVANT LAWS AND REGULATIONS

As far as the Board is aware, the Group has complied with the relevant laws and regulations that have a significant impact on the Group in all material respects.

RELATIONSHIP WITH KEY PARTIES

The Group's success depends on, amongst other matters, the support from key parties which comprises of the customers, suppliers and employees.

Customers

The Group has committed to providing high quality products and satisfactory services to each customer according to their requirements and production plan in order to maintain our brand competitiveness. The Group maintains close contact with the customers and had regular review the requirements of customers and feedbacks. Majority of our top customers have established business relationships with us for approximately 8 to 14 years.

Suppliers and subcontractors

The Group has established stable and long-term relationship with its major hot rolled steel coils suppliers. We maintain an approved suppliers list for suppliers who have passed our assessment criteria and any supplier who fails to meet our requirements will be removed from the approved suppliers list. Majority of our top suppliers have established business relationship with the Group for approximately 5 to 15 years.

We engage subcontractors to supplement our production capacity and minimise our transportation cost. We have subcontracted the cutting and slitting process of a portion of our hot-dip galvanized steel products to subcontractors who are located in closer proximity to our customers, so as to allow for a quicker response to our customers' orders and delivering our products to those customers in the subcontractors' proximity and in small batches. Our Group has approximately one to four years of relationship with our subcontractors.

Employees

The Group regards its employees as one of its most important and valuable assets. We provide competitive remuneration package, appropriate incentives to employees. We also provide appropriate training to employees with outstanding performance for career advancement. We also place significant emphasis in establishing a safe and healthy work environment for our employees. We have established a set of occupational health and safety procedures, quality plan and procedures.

USE OF NET PROCEEDS FROM LISTING

The shares (the "Shares") of the Company were listed on the Stock Exchange on 19 November 2018 (the "Listing Date") and the net proceeds raised from this initial public offering (including the exercise of the over-allotment option on 12 December 2018) after deducting professional fees, underwriting commissions and other related listing expenses amounted to approximately RMB107,086,000 (the "IPO Proceeds").

As stated in the prospectus of the Company dated 31 October 2018 (the "Prospectus"), the intended uses of the IPO Proceeds are set out as follows:

- 1. approximately 96.1% of the IPO Proceeds, other than the proceeds from over-allotment option (as described in the Prospectus), will be used for construction of the buildings, production facilities and equipment and installation of hot-dip galvanization line to expand the production capacity and increase the production efficiency;
- 2. approximately 3.9% of the IPO Proceeds, other than the proceeds from over-allotment option, will be used to repay a bank loan at an interest rate of 5.76% per annum which was due for repayment in December 2018; and
- 3. proceeds from the over-allotment option will be used to repay outstanding loans.

The remaining balance of the net proceeds was placed with banks. There was no change in the intended use of net proceeds as previously disclosed in the Prospectus.

As disclosed in the Prospectus, the Directors have identified two parcels of land which are in proximity to the Group's current production facilities and were then available for lease and manufacturing uses in late 2018 and based on the business development plan, the construction work of the new production plant should have begun and the instalment payment for production facilities and equipment should have been made as at 31 December 2019.

However, pursuant to the communication with the People's Government of Hengshanqiao Town, Wujin District, Changzhou City (常州市武進區橫山橋鎮人民政府) (the "People's Government"), according to the latest master planning of Hengshanqiao Town, the two parcels of land identified by the Company would no longer be classified as industrial use but reclassified by the PRC government as agricultural use, rendering it not fitting into the Group's expansion plan. As securing suitable land parcels is the most critical stage of our development plan, based on the latest industrial land policy, the management has visited and explored different possible locations in close proximity to the Group's current production base, negotiated with different potential landlords and actively communicated with the People's Government. The development plan is behind schedule at the moment and once the suitable land parcels is secured, it is expected that the development plan will be implemented as it was intended.

RESULTS AND APPROPRIATIONS

The results of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2019 and the Group's state of affairs as at that date are set out in the consolidated financial statements in this annual report.

The Board has resolved to recommend the payment of a final dividend of HK\$0.008 per ordinary share for the year ended 31 December 2019 to the shareholders subject to shareholders' approval at the forthcoming annual general meeting.

Therefore, each of 江蘇常州經濟開發管理委員會,常州東方新城建設有限公司 and 常州東方水務投資發展有限公司 are deemed to be interested in same number of shares in which 香港東方控股實業有限公司 is interested under the SFO.

Save as disclosed above, as at 31 December 2019, the Directors have not been notified by any persons who had interests or short positions in the shares or underlying shares which would fall to be disclosed to the Company pursuant to Division 2 and 3 of Part XV of the SFO, or as recorded in the register required to be kept by the Company pursuant to Section 336 of the SFO.

PURCHASE, SALE OR REDEMPTION OF THE COMPANY'S SHARES

The Company has not redeemed any of its securities during the year ended 31 December 2019 (the "Reporting Period") and neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries has purchased or sold any of the Company's securities during the Reporting Period

SHARE OPTIONS

The Company has conditionally adopted the share option scheme ("Share Option Scheme"), which was approved by written resolution passed by its shareholders on 25 October 2018.

The purpose of the Share Option Scheme is to enable the Group to grant options to selected participants as incentives or rewards for their contribution to the Group. The Directors consider the Share Option Scheme, with its broadened basis of participation, will enable the Group to reward the employees, the Directors and other selected participants for their contributions to the Group. Given that the Directors are entitled to determine any performance targets to be achieved as well as the minimum period that an option must be held before an option can be exercised on a case by case basis, and that the exercise price of an option cannot in any event fall below the price stipulated in the Listing Rules or such higher price as may be fixed by the Directors, it is expected that grantees of an option will make an effort to contribute to the development of the Group so as to bring about an increased market price of the shares in order to capitalise on the benefits of the options granted.

The terms of the Share Option Scheme are in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 17 of the Listing Rules. Details of the principal terms of the Share Option Scheme are set out below:

- The Directors may, at its absolute discretion, make an offer to grant options to any employee of the Group, any
 non-executive Directors (including independent non-executive Directors), any suppliers, any customers, any adviser
 or any participants who shall be determined by the Directors from time to time on the basis that the Directors'
 opinion as to his contribution to the development and growth of the Group.
- The maximum number of ordinary shares which may be issued upon exercise of all options to be granted under the Share Option Scheme or any other share option schemes adopted by the Company shall not exceed 10% of the ordinary shares in issue upon the Listing (the Company may refresh this 10% limit under certain conditions) or 30% of the ordinary shares in issue from time to time where there are options to be granted and yet to be exercised.
- The total number of ordinary shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of the options granted to each qualified person under the Share Option Scheme or any other share option schemes adopted by the Company in any twelve-month period must not exceed 1% of the ordinary shares in issue. Any further grant of options which would result in the number of ordinary shares exceeding 1% requires a shareholders' approval with the relevant participant and its associates abstaining from voting.
- The offer of a grant of share options may be accepted within 21 days from the date the offer together with the payment of nominal consideration of HK\$1 by the grantee. The period (the "Option Period") within which the options must be exercised shall be determined by the Directors at the time of grant and such period must expire no later than 10 years from the date the offer has been made to the grantees. All outstanding options shall lapse, among other circumstances, when the grantee ceases to be a participant of the Share Option Scheme by reason of the termination of his/her employment.

- The subscription price will be determined by the Board at the time the grant of the options is made and shall not be less than the highest of:
 - (i) the closing price of the shares as stated in the daily quotations sheet issued by the Stock Exchange on the grant date;
 - (ii) the average closing price of the shares as stated in the daily quotations sheets issued by the Stock Exchange for the five business days immediately preceding the grant date; and
 - (iii) the nominal value of a share.
- The Share Option Scheme is valid and effective for a period of ten years commencing on 25 October 2018 (being the date of adoption of the Share Option Scheme).

As at 31 December 2019, there was no option outstanding, granted, cancelled, exercised or lapsed.

CONNECTED TRANSACTIONS

During the year, the Group had the following transactions and arrangements with connected persons (as defined in the Listing Rules) of the Company which are required to be reported in this annual report in compliance with the disclosure requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules:

1. Continuing connected transaction with Changzhou Nankai Trading Co., Ltd. (常州南 凱物貿有限公司) ("Nankai Trading")

On 25 October 2018, Jiangsu Jiangnan Precision Metal Material Co., Limited ("Jiangnan Precision") (being an indirectly wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company) entered into a framework sales agreement with Nankai Trading from the Listing Date to 31 December 2020. Nankai Trading is 60% owned by Mr. Mei Yiqiu ("Mr. Mei YQ"), a cousin of Mr. Mei Zefeng who is one of the Controlling Shareholders of the Company ("Framework Sales Agreement (I)").

Pursuant to the Framework Sales Agreement (I), Nankai Trading agrees to purchase from Jiangnan Precision scrap metal materials. The purchase price of scrap metal materials is to be determined in the ordinary course of business on normal commercial terms, negotiated on an arm's length basis and on the following principles: (i) the market price of scrap metal materials, steel wires and other similar products charged by nearby independent manufacturers; and (ii) factors including quantity of purchase and mode of delivery. In determining the market price, the Company will compare the prices of scrap metal materials, steel wires and other similar products from at least two nearby independent manufacturers of those products to ensure that price is no more favourable than those offered by the Group to independent third parties.

The annual caps of the transaction amounts for the three financial years ending 31 December 2018, 2019 and 2020 are RMB12.2 million, RMB12.2 million and RMB12.2 million respectively. The total transaction amounts under the Framework Sales Agreement (I) for the year ended 31 December 2018 and 2019 were approximately RMB12.0 million and RMB9.8 million respectively.

2. Continuing connected transaction with Changzhou Nankai Metal Co. Ltd. (常州南凱金屬製品有限公司) ("Nankai Metal")

On 25 October 2018, Jiangnan Precision entered into a framework sales agreement with Nankai Metal which is 45% owned by Mr. Mei YQ ("Framework Sales Agreement (II)") from the Listing Date to 31 December 2020.

Pursuant to the Framework Sales Agreement (II), Nankai Metal agrees to purchase from Jiangnan Precision scrap metal materials. The purchase price of scrap metal materials is to be determined in the ordinary course of business on normal commercial terms, negotiated on an arm's length basis and on the following principles: (i) the market price of scrap metal materials, steel wires and other similar products charged by nearby independent manufacturers; and (ii) factors including quantity of purchase and mode of delivery. In determining the market price, the Company will compare the prices of scrap metal materials, steel wires and other similar products from at least two nearby independent manufacturers of those products to ensure that price is no more favourable than those offered by the Group to independent third parties.

The annual caps of the transaction amounts for the three financial years ending 31 December 2018, 2019 and 2020 are RMB5.3 million, RMB5.3 million and RMB5.3 million respectively. The total transaction amounts under the Framework Sales Agreement (II) for the year ended 31 December 2018 and 2019 were approximately RMB5.2 million and RMB1.0 million respectively.

As the Framework Sales Agreement (I) and Framework Sales Agreement (II) involves Mr. Mei YQ who is a connected party to the Company and the subject matter of the agreements involves the sale of scrap metal materials, the continuing connected transactions contemplated under the agreements were aggregated for consideration.

The independent non-executive Directors have reviewed the above continuing connected transactions (collectively, the "Continuing Connected Transactions") and confirmed that they were entered into (i) in the ordinary and usual course of business of the Group; (ii) either on normal commercial terms or on terms not less favourable to the Group than terms available to or from independent third parties; and (iii) in accordance with the relevant agreement(s) governing them on terms that are fair and reasonable and in the interests of the shareholders of the Company as a whole.

Furthermore, the auditors of the Company have confirmed to the Board that the above-mentioned Continuing Connected Transactions (i) have been approved by the Board; (ii) are in accordance with the pricing policies of the Group where such transactions involve the provision of goods or services by the Group; (iii) have been entered into in accordance with the relevant agreements governing such transactions; and (iv) have not exceed the respective annual cap as set by the Company.

The independent auditors of the Company (the "Independent Auditors") were engaged to report on the Company's continuing connected transactions in accordance with Hong Kong Standard on Assurance Engagements 3000 (Revised) Assurance Engagements Other Than Audits or Reviews of Historical Financial Information and with reference to Practice Note 740 Auditor's Letter on Continuing Connected Transactions under the Listing Rules issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The Independent Auditors have issued their unqualified letter containing their findings and conclusions in respect of the continuing connected transactions made by the Group disclosed above in accordance with rule 14A.56 of the Listing Rules. A copy of the Independent Auditors' letter has been provided by the Company to the Stock Exchange.

MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

The Group's largest customer and five largest customers for the year ended 31 December 2019 accounted for approximately 16.3% and 49.1% respectively of the Group's total turnover for the year.

The Group's largest supplier and five largest suppliers for the year ended 31 December 2019 accounted for approximately 68.6% and 82.4% respectively of the Group's total purchases for the year.

According to the understanding of the Directors, none of the Directors, their associates or any shareholders who owned more than 5% of the Company's share capital had any interests in the five largest customers or suppliers at any time during the year ended 31 December 2019.

EMOLUMENT POLICY AND DIRECTOR'S REMUNERATION

The remuneration committee was set up for reviewing the Group's emoluments policy and advise the remuneration of the Directors and senior management of the Group with reference to their duties, responsibilities, experience and performance and also the results of the Group. Details of the remuneration of the Directors and the five highest paid individuals during the year ended 31 December 2019 are set out in notes 8 and 9 to the consolidated financial statements.

RETIREMENT BENEFIT SCHEMES

Details of the retirement benefit schemes operated by the Group are set out in note 6(b) to the financial statements.

LITIGATION AND ARBITRATION

As at the date of this report, there was no outstanding or pending litigation and arbitration for the Group.

PRE-EMPTIVE RIGHTS

There are no provisions for pre-emptive rights under the Articles of Association or the law of Cayman Islands which would oblige the Company to offer new shares on a pro-rata basis to the existing shareholders.

NON-ADJUSTING EVENT AFTER THE REPORTING PERIOD

Details of non-adjusting event after the Reporting Period are set out in note 27 to the consolidated financial statements.

SUFFICIENCY OF PUBLIC FLOAT

Based on the information that is publicly available to the Company and within the knowledge of the Directors, the Company has maintained a sufficient public float throughout the year and up to the date of this annual report.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE PRACTICES

The Board believes that good corporate governance is essential to the success of the Company and to the enhancement of shareholder value. The Company is committed to building and maintaining high standards of corporate governance to enhance its transparency and accountability. The Company's corporate governance practices are based on the principles and the code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code ("CG Code") as set out in Appendix 14 to the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the Stock Exchange (the "Listing Rules").

Under the code provision A.6.7 of the CG Code, independent non-executive directors ("INED") should attend general meetings to develop a balanced understanding of the views of shareholders. During the year, not all INEDs attended general meetings of the Company due to other business engagements, which have deviated from the code provision A.6.7 of the CG Code.

Throughout the Reporting Period, the Company has applied the principles in the CG Code which are applicable to the Company and, in the opinion of the Directors, save for the deviation of the code provision A.6.7 as described above, the Company has complied with all applicable code provisions set out in the CG Code.

The Board will continually review and monitor its corporate governance practices to ensure compliance with the CG Code.

Board Meetings and Directors' Attendance Records at Board and General Meeting

Under the code provision A.1.1 of the CG Code, the Board should meet regularly and board meetings should be held at least four times a year at approximately quarterly intervals, either in person or through electronic communication, to review the Group's overall strategies, financial and operational performances, approve the annual and interim results of the Group, assess the risk management and internal control systems, and discuss other significant matters. In addition, the Board holds general meeting to maintain an on-going dialogue with the Shareholders.

The Board held nine Board meetings in 2019 of which four were regular meetings at approximately quarterly intervals to discuss and review the Group's business development, operations and financial performance. All Directors have the opportunity to include matters in the agenda for a Board meeting. Notices of regular Board meetings will be sent to Directors at least 14 days before the meeting date. For other Board and committee meetings, reasonable time is generally given.

The agenda together with relevant information will be sent to all Directors at least 3 days before each Board meeting to enable them to make informed decisions. The Board and each director also have separate and independent access to the senior management when necessary.

Directors can, upon reasonable request, seek independent professional advice in appropriate circumstances, at the expenses of the Company. The Board shall resolve to provide separate independent professional advice to Directors to assist the relevant Directors to discharge their duties to the Company.

Minutes of each Board meeting will be drafted by the Company Secretary to record the matters discussed and decision resolved at the Board meetings and circulated to the Board for comment within a reasonable time after each meeting. The final Board minutes are kept by the Company Secretary and are available for inspection by Directors.

If a substantial shareholder or a Director has a conflict of interest in a matter to be considered by the Board which the Board has determined to be material, the matter will be dealt with in accordance with applicable rules and regulations and, if appropriate, an independent Board committee will be set up to deal with the matter.

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

Under the code provision A.2.1 of the CG Code, the roles and responsibilities of chairman and chief executive officer should be separated and should not be performed by the same individual.

The chairman of the Board and the chief executive officer are currently two separate positions held by Ms. Liu Ping and Mr. Zhang Zhihong respectively. The chairman of the Board is responsible for providing strategic advice and guidance on the business development of the Group, while the chief executive officer is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Group.

Independent Non-executive Directors

The Board at all the times had at least three independent non-executive Directors with at least one independent non-executive Director has appropriate professional qualifications on accounting or related financial management expertise during the year ended 2019. The total number of independent non-executive Directors representing at least one-third of the Board maintain a strong independent element on the Board in order to exercise independent judgment.

The Company has received, from each independent non-executive Directors of the Company, written annual confirmation of their independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Company is of the view that all independent non-executive Directors are independent.

During the Reporting Period, the Chairman had a meeting with the independent non-executive Directors without the presence of other Directors.

Appointment, Re-election and Removal of Directors

The procedures and process of appointment, re-election and removal of Directors are laid down in the Company's Articles of Association.

The Nomination Committee is responsible for reviewing the Board composition, monitoring the appointment and succession planning of Directors and assessing the independence of independent non-executive Directors. In selecting and approving candidate for directorship, the Board will consider various criteria such as education, qualification, experience, integrity and the potential contribution to the Group.

Each of the executive Directors has entered into a service agreement with the Company for a term of three years, subject to renewal after the expiry of the then current term. Each of the independent non-executive Directors has entered into an appointment letter with the Company for a term of three years, subject to renewal after the expiry of the then current term.

In accordance with the Company's Articles of Association, all Directors of the Company are subject to retirement by rotation at an annual general meeting at least once every three years. Any new Director appointed by the Board to fill a causal vacancy shall submit himself for re-election by shareholders at the first general meeting of the Company after appointment and new Directors appointed as an addition to the Board shall submit himself/herself for re-election by shareholders at the next following annual general meeting of the Company after appointment.

Responsibilities of the Board and Management

The Board is responsible for formulating the business plans and strategies, monitoring the business performance, risk management and internal control, approving investment proposals, reviewing the finance performance and appointment of directors and other significant operational matters of the Group. The daily operations of the Group and execution of the business plans are delegated to the management of the Group. Prior to entering into any significant transactions, Board approval should be obtained. In addition, the Board has established Board Committees and has delegated to these Board Committees various responsibilities set out in their terms of reference respectively.

The Company has established written guidelines on no less exacting terms than the Model Code for employees who are likely to be in possession of unpublished inside information of the Company. No incident of non-compliance of the guidelines was noted.

Corporate Governance Report

All Directors shall ensure that they carry out duties in good faith, in compliance with applicable laws and regulations, and in the interests of the Company and its shareholders at all times. In addition, every director should ensure sufficient time and attention to the affairs of the Company and disclose the number and nature of offices held in public companies or organization and other significant commitments as well as the identity of the public companies or organizations and the time involved. The Directors have agreed to disclose their commitments and any subsequent change to the Company in a timely manner.

The Company has arranged for appropriate insurance cover for directors' and officers' liabilities in respect of legal actions against its directors arising out of corporate activities.

Continuous Professional Development

Newly appointed Director will be arranged a comprehensive, formal and tailored induction which includes provision of key guidelines, documents and publications relevant to their roles, responsibilities and ongoing obligations; a briefing on the Company's structure, businesses, risk management and other governance practices and meeting with other fellow Directors so as to help the newly appointed Directors familiarize with the management, business and governance policies and practices of the Company, and ensure that they have a proper understanding of the operations and businesses of the Company.

The Company encourages its directors to participate in continuous professional development courses and seminars organized by professional institutions or professional firms at the Company's expense and read materials on relevant topics, likes corporate governance, director's duties and responsibilities, listing rules and other relevant ordinances, so that they can continuously update and further improve their relevant knowledge and skills.

During the Reporting Period, the Company provided an in-house training conducted by an external legal advisor covering the amendment of Listing Rules. In addition to the in-house training, the Directors have been provided with relevant reading materials.

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BOARD COMMITTEES

The final version of the committee minutes are kept by the company secretary (the "Company Secretary") and such minutes are open for inspection by any Director. All committees are provided with sufficient resources to discharge their duties and, upon reasonable request, are able to seek independent professional advice in appropriate circumstances, at the Company's expense.

In assessing the suitability of a proposed candidate before recommending to the Board for it to consider and make recommendations to shareholders for election as Directors at general meetings or appoint as Directors to fill casual vacancies, the Nomination Committee will consider:

- (a) the highest personal and professional ethics and integrity;
- (b) proven achievement and competence in the nominee's field and the ability to exercise sound business judgment;
- (c) skills that are complementary to those of the existing Board;
- (d) the ability to assist and support management and make significant contributions to the Company's success;
- (e) an understanding of the fiduciary responsibilities that is required of a member of the Board and the commitment of time and energy necessary to diligently carry out those responsibilities; and
- (f) independence: the independent non-executive director candidates should meet the "independence" criteria as required under the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Listing Rules") and the composition of the Board is in conformity with the provisions of the Listing Rules.

Other than the foregoing, the Nomination Committee may also consider such other factors as it may deem are in the best interests of the Company and its Shareholders.

During the year ended 2019, there was no change in the composition of the Board. The Nomination Committee will review the Nomination Policy, as appropriate, to ensure its effectiveness.

Board Diversity Policy

In order to achieving a sustainable and balanced development, the Company considers the enhancement of diversity at the Board level as an essential element in facilitating the achievement of its strategic objectives and sustainable development. In deciding the Board composition, board diversity has been considered from a number of aspects, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, skills and knowledge. All Board appointments will be based on meritocracy, and candidates will be considered against objective criteria, having due regard to the benefits of diversity to the board. The selection of candidates will be based on a range of diverse perspectives, including but not limited to, gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, skills and knowledge. The ultimate decision will be based upon the merits and contribution the selected candidates will bring to the Board.

The Nomination Committee review the structure of the Board annually. The Board currently comprises 8 Directors of which 6 are male and 2 are female. The age of the Directors range from 32 to 79. The Board comprised renowned experts in the area of steel manufacturing and processing industry, finance, accounting, capital market, corporate governance and management. The Nomination Committee considers that the Board is sufficiently diversified.

The Nomination Committee will review the Board Diversity Policy, as appropriate, to ensure its effectiveness.

Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee comprises four members, including three independent non-executive Directors, namely Mr. Cao Baozhong (chairman), Mr. Li Yuen Fai Roger and Mr. Yang Guang, and one executive Director, namely Mr. Zhang Zhihong.

The Remuneration Committee is responsible for reviewing the contract terms of Directors and senior management of the Group; making recommendations to the Board regarding the Group's policies and structure for remuneration of Directors and senior management of the Group; making recommendations to the Board on the remuneration packages of individual Directors and senior management and reviewing and approving incentive schemes and performance-based remuneration.

The terms of reference of the Remuneration Committee are in line with the CG Code and are accessible through the Company's website.

Remuneration Committee met once to review and make recommendation to the Board on the remuneration policy and structure of the Company and the remuneration packages of the Directors and other related matters.

Corporate Governance Functions

RISK MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROL

The Board is responsible for maintaining sound and effective risk management and internal control systems of the Group to safeguard shareholders' investment and the Group's assets. The Company does not establish its internal audit department in view of its existing scale and complexity of business operation. SECTION A: ENVIRONMENTAL

The Group understands the significance of environmental protection and pledges not to grow its business at the expense of the environment. We strongly believe in the value of keeping abreast of the trends in environmental policy and aligning our business with the relevant regulations. A healthy environment is fundamental to the Group's sustainable development, hence we endeavor to integrate components of environmental sustainability into our business operations through various measures, so as to decrease our carbon emission level and the relevant intensity¹.

With our dedicated effort, there was no material non-compliance in laws and regulations related to the environment for the Reporting Year. The Group will continue to be alert to any non-compliance behavior related to critical environmental issues.

Emissions

Air Pollution Emission

The Group's core business activities include manufacturing and processing galvanized steel products, which require production facilities such as fixed machines and equipment driven by natural gas. These fixed machines and equipment are mainly used for steel-galvanizing, colour-coating and hydrogen production. Apart from stationary machineries, certain kinds of mobile combustion sources were also involved in the business operations of the Group during the Reporting Year. The material air pollutants emitted from the operations of the aforementioned sources were mainly composed of sulphur oxides ("SO_x"), nitrogen oxides ("NO_x") and particulate matter ("PM"). During the Reporting Year, the total natural gas and petrol consumptions amounted to approximately 11 million m³ (2018: 10 million m³) and 16,700 L (2018: 10,400 L) respectively. The total air pollutants produced due to the fuel consumption approximated to 2,150 kg² (2018: 1,900 kg), with an intensity of approximately 4 kg per employee (2018: 4 kg). Compared to last year, the total air pollution emission during the Reporting Year has increased by 12% mainly due to the increased consumption of natural gas and petrol during production as well as normal business operations. To further minimize the production of air pollutants, all fixed machines and vehicles are under frequent checks and maintenance in order to ensure energy efficiency.

The air pollutant emission factor from natural gas consumption was assumed to be as same as that from LPG, which was equivalent to 4.02 and 0.02 kg/million MJ of gas for NO_x and SO_x respectively, latest announced by the Stock Exchange in their Reporting Guide.

Greenhouse Gas Emission

Global warming is mainly attributable to greenhouse gas emissions. During the Reporting Year, the total greenhouse gas ("GHG") emission by the Group weighted approximately 87,800 tons (2018: 72,000 tons), with a 22% increase compared to last Year due to the inclusion of GHG emissions from natural gas consumption in this ESG report. The main culprits of the GHG emission by the Group were direct emission from sources (scope 1 emission) and indirect emissions from electricity and gas consumption (scope 2 emission), which accounted for approximately 38% and 62% of the GHG emission respectively. Alongside the aforementioned sources, other indirect emission sources include electricity used in fresh water and sewage processing, paper waste disposal at landfills and business air travels by our employees, which accounted for the remaining less than 1% of the GHG emission as a whole. During the Reporting Year, the intensity was approximately 158 tons per employee (2018: 149 tons per employees), with a slight increase of 5.88% compared with last Year, considering the total number of 556 employees (2018: 483) by the end of the Reporting Year.

As electricity consumption and the operations of fixed machines and equipment were the major sources of the Group's carbon emission, the Group will continue to strengthen the energy-saving measures in its daily operations. We continued to encourage our staff to turn off idle appliances and adopt the use of energy-efficient appliances. The use of natural lighting in both our office and factory was also encouraged. Apart from these measures, the Group will conduct regular checks and maintenance of the fixed machines and equipment, so as to ensure their energy efficiency and minimize the production of greenhouse gases.

³ According to the《二氧化碳排放核算方法及數據核查表》published by the Ministry of Ecology and Environment, PRC on 15 May 2016, the power supply discharge coefficient of Jiangsu Province was set at 0.7498 kg/kWh.

The CO₂ emission factor from natural gas consumption was assumed to be as same as that from town gas, which was equivalent to 11.7 tons/million MJ, latest announced by The Hong Kong and China Gas Company Limited in their Sustainability Report 2018.

The data was not disclosed in the last year ESG report. In order to present a more comprehensive result, the Group included this data since this ESG report.

The per unit electricity consumption for processing fresh water and sewage in the PRC was assumed to be at 0.577 kWh and 0.28 kWh, which were as same as the case in Hong Kong according to the 2017/2018 Annual Report of Water Supplies Department and 2018/19 Sustainability Report of Drainage Services Department, HKSAR.

Adjustment had been made on GHG emissions from electricity used for processing sewage when compared with 402.81 tons disclosed in last year ESG report, due to the revisit of the data for a more accurate result.

Waste Management

Hazardous Waste

Unregulated disposal of hazardous waste can result in natural hazards undermining both the well-beings of the population and the nature. As our production involves the production of chemical waste, stringent waste management has always been one of our main objectives. During the Reporting year, the hazardous waste was under good control as we continued to adopt our well-developed waste management system. Hence, no significant amount of hazardous waste was disposed or emitted for the Reporting Year.

Sewage

Sewage was produced by the Group's daily production operations such as the processes of pickling and degreasing metals, as well as the operation of levelling machines and rollers. The Group placed significant emphasis on the reduction of sewage. Hence, a mature sewage-handling system with a closed-circuit had been adopted to purify sewage and convert it to clean water for reuse. As such, there was no significant amount of sewage disposed by the Group during the Reporting Year.

Acid Waste

During the metal pickling process, acid waste would be produced. During the Reporting Year, the Group had produced approximately 11,200 tons of acid waste, with an intensity of approximately 20 tons per employee. To ensure safe disposal of the acid waste, the Group had implemented two approaches. The first approach involved an internal neutralization system which neutralized the acid waste with alkali to produce pH-neutral sewage for further processing in the sewage-handling system. The Group closely monitored the neutralization process by frequent checks to ensure the inputted alkali is at a pH value of around 11, so that the system could operate as intended. After that, the sewage would be processed as mentioned above.

Alongside the internal neutralization system, the Group had also contracted with the qualified external waste management service providers to transfer the acid waste. The Group kept good record of the transfers. By monitoring the processes closely, the Group could ensure that they had been implemented effectively, as well as minimizing the possibility of irresponsible disposal of acid waste. With our efforts in regulating the handling of acid waste, no significant amount of acid waste was disposed by the Group, with all the acid waste being handled in appropriate manners following relevant laws and regulations, during the Reporting Year.

Gaseous Waste

As a range of chemicals were used in the production process, several kinds of gaseous hydrocarbons would be produced. To counter the gaseous waste produced, the Group had installed a hydrocarbon removal system to manage the production of hydrocarbons. The system analyzed gaseous waste production by automatically sketching various kinds of data graphs. Based on the data collected, the system then operated to remove any hydrocarbons produced by undergoing chemical reactions, physical removal or incineration. The system was proven to be effective as no significant amount of gaseous waste was emitted during the Reporting Year. To further strengthen its ability to remove gaseous waste, the Group will conduct frequent checks and maintenance of the system, so that it can operate as intended to minimize the emission of hydrocarbons to the atmosphere.

Environmental, Social and Governance Report

Other Hazardous Waste

Alongside the aforementioned wastes, there were other kinds of chemical wastes including oil, emulsion and sludge. Similar to the management process of the acid waste, the Group had contracted with qualified external waste management service providers to transfer the chemical waste. The Group also kept good records of the transfers, so as to ensure that processes had been implemented effectively, as well as to minimize the possibility of irresponsible disposal of hazardous waste. On top of this, the Group reported to the government the amount of the chemical waste transferred on a regular basis.

Policies of Hazardous Waste Management

With respect to the above hazardous wastes, the Group has implemented a number of policies to manage the storage, handling and transfer of the wastes in order to avoid any leakage of chemicals, in turn protecting both its employees and the environment. The hazardous wastes must:

- 1. be managed by authorized personnel;
- 2. be stored on a timely basis;
- 3. be collected, stored, transferred, used and handled in compliance with the laws and regulations; and
- 4. be recorded on the relevant register.

With all the above measures, safe and effective waste management can be implemented. The Group will strive to minimize the risk of natural hazards caused by unregulated disposal of the aforementioned wastes.

Non-Hazardous Waste

There were mainly two types of non-hazardous waste produced by the Group, namely inert waste, which was the remaining scrap of materials after metal processing, and paper waste. As the remaining materials were re-sold to third parties as raw materials for further production, only paper waste was disposed to the landfills. The total paper waste disposed by the Group during the Reporting Year amounted to approximately 3.06 tons (2018: 6.21 tons), with an intensity of approximately 5.51 kg per employee (2018: 13 kg per employee).

With our effort in waste reduction, the total paper waste produced during the Reporting Year has decreased significantly by 51%, with its corresponding intensity dropping by approximately 58%.

As logging is involved in the paper production process, it provokes both direct and indirect negative impacts on the environment. To advocate a paperless work environment, we encouraged our employees to use electronic systems and documents instead of printed documents. A collection box had also been placed in the office to collect paper-made products including paper boxes, envelopes and reusable paper for the recycling purposes. To further strengthen our reduction in paper waste, the Group will advocate natural resources conservation in a bid to remind our employees of the importance of paper waste reduction.

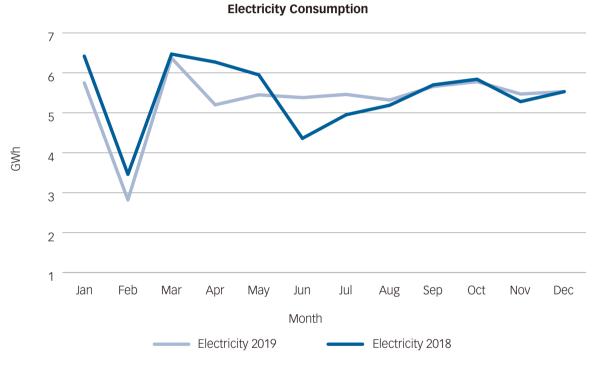
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Use of Resources

The Group pledges to become an environmental-friendly and sustainable enterprise. We understand that the use of resources involves indirect emissions as well. As such, to reduce carbon emission and footprint, we have undertaken a range of carbon reduction measures in our daily operations.

Energy Consumption

During the Reporting Year, the total electricity consumption amounted to approximately 64.19 GWh (2018: 66.07 GWh), with an intensity of approximately 115 MWh per employee (2018: 137 MWh per employee). Compared with last year, the total electricity consumption has decreased by approximately 3%, with a reduction of 16% regarding the corresponding intensity. Meanwhile, the total natural gas consumption⁸ during the Reporting Year was approximately 147 GWh, with an intensity of approximately 264 MWh per employee.



The Group places much emphasis of energy conservation. While high energy consumption was unavoidable in production processes, the Group encouraged every employee to switch off all idle appliances and ensure that all electronic appliances had been switched off before they left the office. In the office and workshops, the Group also encouraged its staff to develop an energy-saving habit by using natural lighting whenever possible instead of electric lighting. Apart from these, the Group will purchase energy-efficient electronic appliances in the future, as well as upgrading current ones for energy-efficient alternatives in long run. We promise to put in more efforts in the aspect of energy conservation to further reduce our carbon footprint.

The data was not disclosed in the last year ESG report. In order to present a more comprehensive result, the Group included this data since this ESG report.

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Water Consumption

Water is one of the most precious natural resources. High consumption of water could undermine the water resources available. In the meantime, processing of fresh water and sewage require electricity, indirectly causing more carbon emissions. Thus the Group took various measures actively to conserve water resources and reduce its carbon footprint. The Group consumed approximately 220,000 m³ (2018: 199,000 m³) water in its business operation during the Reporting Year, with a reduction of approximately 11% compared to the last year. Production processes contributed to most of our water consumption. During the Reporting Year, water consumption intensity was approximately 398 m³ water per employee (2018: 413 m³ water per employee), which saw a slight decrease of 4% compared to last year. As our water sources were from the governmental body as well as our own sewage purification system, there was no water supply issue identified for the Reporting Year.

Effective use of water can significantly whittle down the indirect consumption of electricity during water processing, as well as promoting water conservation. The Group encouraged its staff to save and use less water by posting labels in the office in a bid to raise the awareness of water conservation among the staff. We will also continue to monitor our use of water closely, so as to minimize the corresponding carbon footprint.

Packaging Materials

The Group's principal activities are the production and processing of galvanized steel products as components of household electronic appliances. Thus, no significant usage of packaging materials was identified for the Reporting Year.

The Environmental and Natural Resources

The Group values environmental sustainability and strives to incorporate it to every aspect of its business, so as to strike a balance between its business development and environmental conservation. As aforementioned, we have adopted a variety of environmental-friendly practices in different aspects of our business. Alongside these, the Group has also developed a wide range of written policies for its employees to comply with in order to minimize the negative impact on the environment.

At the design stage, we require the relevant departments to simplify production process and adopt non-polluting raw materials, which help to reduce potential pollutants and contribute to environmental sustainability. During the production stage, the usage of all kinds of polluting materials are recorded by the production teams as required by the Group's policy, as a reference for future decision-making. Strict guidelines regarding management and monitoring of pollutants produced are also adopted by the Group, which helps its employees to observe the relevant laws and regulations and promote corporate environmental responsibility.

Besides the above measures, the Group has continued to green its workshops and production sites by planting trees and sod. In short, the Group has integrated various means of environmental protection in order to cut down pollution and enhance its employees' environmental awareness in its business operations.

With our efforts made in regard to environmental protection, we are pleased to report that there was no material non-compliance issue regarding relevant laws and regulations for the Reporting Year.

SECTION B: SOCIAL

Employment

Employees are of top priority to the Group as the most cherished assets. We value all our employees' contribution and dedication to our business development equally. We strive to grow with our employees as it is mutually beneficial to both the employees and our business development in the long run. Hence, we adopt employee-oriented approach in creating our workplace, as well as recruiting, training and retaining talents for our business development.

The Group regards human resources as its valuable assets. The Group upholds the principles of fairness and is dedicated to maintaining equal opportunity of employment in relation to personnel matters, irrespective of age, gender, marital status, religion, disability, race or nationality.

The Group has clear policies on employee compensation and dismissal, recruitment and promotion, working hours, rest periods and benefits and welfare. Any updates and amendments are communicated to employees via email or in company meeting.

Employee Benefits

The Group has established a long-term favorable relationship with our employees. We offer competitive and attractive remuneration package, including on-the-job training, year-end bonus, and performance-based incentive bonus to our employees. Social Insurance and Housing Provident Fund are also provided to all employees by the Group. On top of that, continuous assessment of our employees are carried out based on their performance for the decision of salary increase, bonus amount and promotion in order to keep them up to the Group's standard and reward them for their contributions.

Attractive number of leaves are provided to our employees to ensure that they can enjoy work-life balance. Depending on the employment type, we offer our staff three different working-hour systems, namely normal office hour system, two-shift system and three-shift system, all of which can provide enough rest time for our employees. Besides workplace-related benefits, the Group regularly organizes different types of employee activities such as annual dinner, football matches and staff picnic to boost bonding between our employees. We believe that a harmonious workplace is beneficial to our employees' well-being, which in turn enhancing productivity at work.

For the Reporting Year, the Group's monthly average turnover rate was as low as approximately 3.8%, which can be attributed to our competitive employee benefits compared to the market standard.

Apart from our internal employment policies, the Group strictly observes the Labour Law of the People's Republic of China, Social Insurance Law of the People's Republic of China, Regulations on Management of Housing Provident Fund and other relevant laws and regulations which cover all employment protection and benefits.

Environmental, Social and Governance Report

Harmonious Workplace

In a bid to building a harmonious and inclusive workplace, as well as diversifying the backgrounds of our employees, we recruit talents based on experience, expertise and values, regardless of race, colour, creed, national origin, ancestry, sex, marital status, disability, religious or political affiliation, age or sexual orientation. Equal opportunities and diversity for all employees are highly valued by the Group.

As at 31 December 2019, we had a total of 556 employees of various ethnicities in China. Our employees' male-to-female ratio is 376:180, compared to last year's 321:162. We strive to cultivate a harmonious work environment for our employees and eliminate any forms of discrimination within the workplace.

Occupational Health and Safety

The Group is committed to safeguarding the safety, health and welfare of all its employees, workers, and general public who are likely to be affected by the business operations of the Group. To realize our commitment, we have implemented a range of policies with regard to workplace safety. The policies outlines the safety requirements and operating guidelines of every job position, as well as the handling and reporting protocols for accidents. Safety training and fire safety management protocols are also included in our policies.

The Group understands that preventive measures are far more important than reactive measures. Hence, we have implemented a number of measures to promote workplace safety among our employees, including posting safety requirements and guidelines regarding all production modes in every workshop.

We have also equipped our office and workshops with adequate resources for potential accidents. Sufficient fire equipment, such as fire extinguishers and fire hydrants, have been placed in both the office building and workshops. The equipment is under regular checks to ensure that they are in good condition. Fire and emergency drill are organised on a regular basis by the Group to familiarize our employees with the protocols for emergency situations. Performance of these drills are recorded for reviews and improvements. On top of these, safety training is also provided to our employees to ensure that they fully understand our safety policies and requirements, and to prevent them from getting injured.

The Group has set a safety production target and plan, aiming for:

- 1. 0 cases of serious injury or fatality;
- 2. 0 cases of serious fire accident or chemical incident; and
- 3. an injury rate of thousand employees per year being less than or equal to 3%.

During the Reporting Year, there were only 9 cases (2018: 11 cases) of injury with no serious injury or fatal cases reported within the Group. In these cases, 190 days (2018: 213.5 days) of working day were lost as we had pledged to provide sufficient days of sick leave for our employees to compensate for their injuries, and to allow sufficient time for recovery. The Group will conduct regular safety training to ensure employees' knowledge are up to standard and up-to-date. Frequent checks and maintenance of machineries will also be conducted to ensure that they are under good condition for employees to work with. As the Group places its employees' safety as top priority, it will continue to strive for a safe and healthy work environment for its employees and workers.

Development and Training

The Group understands that employee development is indispensable to the company's growth, hence the Group promises to offer sufficient and effective training to its employees. We also review the ability of employees of different levels so that our training can cater to their needs accordingly. In this way, our employees can grow with the Company hand in hand.

The Group offers a range of internal training and development to its employees to enhance their performance, professional skills and knowledge. External training courses and assessments initiated by our employees are also welcomed with subsidies and monetary rewards offered for any professional certificates obtained. The Group conducts performance appraisal on a regular basis to assess its employees' performance, skills and knowledge. If employees' performance is not on par with standard, additional training with assessments will be provided to keep our employees on track, which in turn helps to maintain the work quality. The Group also offers performance-based bonus and salary adjustment to its employees for rewarding their contributions to the Company based on satisfactory performance review results.

As mentioned above in Occupational Health and Safety section, our employees are required to attend safety trainings. The safety trainings focus on the prevention of accidents and procedures for areas including the use of machineries, handling of chemicals, emergency management and incident reporting.

In the Reporting Year, our employees received a total of 463 days (2018: 112 days) of training, including professional skill training, leadership skill training and safety training. The Group will continue to observe the latest trends in the industry and government policies, so as to equip our staff with the necessary skills and knowledge accordingly and keep up with the standard.

Labor Standards

The Group strictly abides by the relevant laws and regulations with regard to child labour, minimum wage specified by the government, as well as Social Insurance and Housing Provident Fund scheme. We are delighted to announce that we did not encounter any major risks in human rights and employment matters so far. The Group guarantees that no employee is made to work against his/her will, or work under forced labour, or subject to coercion related to work. Recruitment of child labour is strictly prohibited. No employee under the age of 18 has been recruited in the Reporting Year. The Group adopts whistle-blowing mechanism, allowing employees to voice out difficulties or injustice they face, so that management can follow up on the matter.

Supply Chain Management

Being a group that manufactures and processes galvanized steel products, we recognize the importance of supply chain management of our major inventories – hot rolled coils and zinc blocks. During the supplier selection process, we take into consideration a range of criteria, including qualification, reputation, product quality, quality consistency and the ability to deliver on time. Only suppliers who pass our initial assessment can be added to our approved supplier list. As at 31 December 2019, we have developed long term relationships with 55 approved suppliers in the PRC, supplying both raw materials and auxiliary materials.

The Group conducts annual assessment of the approved suppliers to ensure that they are up to its required standards. We remove any suppliers with unsatisfactory results from the approved supplier list to ensure that our product quality can be maintained with the use of high-quality raw materials.

Environmental, Social and Governance Report

The Group recognizes the importance of delivering high quality products on time, in which having inventories delivered by the suppliers on a timely manner plays a significant role in our supply chain. To prevent the risk of inventory shortage caused by delayed delivery by the suppliers, we have stocked up our inventories to a safety level of 10,000 to 20,000 tons of raw materials. Apart from that, to minimize the risk of delayed delivery due to natural disasters and weather issues, we have intentionally diversified the major sources of supply to two separate suppliers of hot rolled coils, with one being in eastern PRC and one in northern PRC. With the above mitigating measures, the Group did not encounter any inventory shortage in the Reporting Year.

Being the midstream of the supply chain, not only do we focus on the upstream suppliers, but we also value the development of long-term relationship with our downstream customers. As mentioned, timely delivery is the fundamental to successful supply chain management. To enhance our effectiveness and efficiency in delivering products to our customers, the Group has adopted both motor and water transport depending on the travel distance. By adopting two different delivery means, it helps to reduce the operating costs and enhance the efficiency of delivery significantly.

Product Responsibility

Since the Group specializes on the manufacturing and processing of galvanized steel products, we are committed to complying with, and even exceeding relevant industry and safety standards as well as quality control, in a bid to safeguarding both the company reputation and public interests.

Quality Standards

The Group has set up a Quality Policy to commit ourselves to providing satisfactory services that meets our customers' needs. The policy covers the inspection of purchased materials, inspection of production processes and procedures of dealing with unsatisfactory products. We have continued to maintain our quality management system to high standard. With regard to our compliance with relevant requirements, the Group has been certified with ISO 9001: 2015 standard, which is applicable to the "Production of Cold Rolled Coils, Hot Zinc Coating Coils, and Color Coating Steel Coils".

Internal Inspection

The Group conducts 4 stages of internal inspection starting from i) purchased materials, ii) first stage of work-in-progress products, iii) second stage of work-in-progress products, and iv) finished goods. At every inspection stage, only the materials and products that have passed our assessment can be used for further processing. For materials and products below standard, the quality inspectors either consider re-work of the materials or disposal according to the guidelines of the management procedures. Rectification report is also prepared for every unqualified case encountered in order to analyze the cause and give recommendations for future improvements.

Customers' Response

The Group always treasures the customer relationship as an invaluable asset. We invite our customers to evaluate our performance regarding the product quality, product price and ability of on-time delivery. Most of our evaluation results are of satisfactory results. During the Reporting Year, there were 27 cases of complaints regarding product quality reported. We recorded the complaints and ways of handling complaints in detail, so that we could analyze the cause and prevent similar cases from repeating in the future. We will continue to keep good relationship with our customers and maintain our current practice of complaint management.

Relevant Laws and Regulations

Staying alert to compliance issues and inspecting deficiencies are essential as they prevent problems from escalating and undermining the Group's interests. Therefore, the Group keeps a close eye on the updates of relevant regulations and codes and revises its policies and operations accordingly, so as to prevent any malpractice. With our preventive measures and stringent quality control system, there was no non-compliance issue reported during the Reporting Year. We will strive to maintain the quality of our products for our precious customers.

Anti-corruption

The Group has established an "Anti-Bribery & Anti-Corruption Management Policy" which outlines the definition of bribery and corruption, the Group's stance and the responsibilities of its employees pertinent to anti-corruption. The Group takes this matter in serious manner and prohibits its employees from accepting any forms of gifts and benefits without proper permission. All employees are required to sign a letter of commitment for performing duties with integrity, such that no bribe, fraud or money laundering should be performed for their personal gains at the expense of the Group's interests. As at 31 December 2019, there was no concluded legal case regarding any forms of fraud brought against the Group or its employees.

The Group encourages its employees to report alleged malpractices or misconduct. We value and welcome our employees to report any suspected malpractices through various channels, while the management will take immediate action to investigate the issue. The Group promises to fully support the whistleblowers with the identity of the whistleblowers being well protected. We will also stay alert to corruption cases and specific practices pertinent to the industry, so that we can implement policies in response to those accordingly.

Community Investment

The Group has actively participated in the community investment. During the Reporting Year, 76 of our employees were engaged in a 4-hour charitable activity to raise funds for children living in poverty in PRC. We will continue to invest more resources and engage more employees in community investment, as well as investing our resources to areas other than poverty. By doing so, the Group hopes to encourage its employees to serve the community, while promoting corporate social responsibility and bringing positive impacts to the society.

REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

The Group did not encounter any cases of non-compliance with laws and regulations that pose significant impacts on the Group in the areas of emissions, employment, health and safety, labour standards, product responsibility and anti-corruption during the Reporting Year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT



Independent auditor's report to the shareholders of KangLi International Holdings Limited

(Incorporated in the Cayman Islands with limited liability)

OPINION

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of KangLi International Holdings Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (the "Group") set out on pages 62 to 127, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at 31 December 2019, the consolidated statement of profit or loss, the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, the consolidated statement of changes in equity and the consolidated cash flow statement for the year then ended and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position of the Group as at 31 December 2019 and of its consolidated financial performance and its consolidated cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs") issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (the "IASB") and have been properly prepared in compliance with the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with Hong Kong Standards on Auditing ("HKSAs") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (the "HKICPA"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the consolidated financial statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the HKICPA's *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the "Code") together with any ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the consolidated financial statements in the Cayman Islands, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS (CONTINUED)

Valuation of inventories

Refer to Note 13 to the consolidated financial statements and the accounting policies in Note 2(i)(i).

The Key Audit Matter

At 31 December 2019, inventories of the Group comprised raw materials and consumables, and finished goods. The carrying amount of the Group's raw materials and finished goods at 31 December 2019 amounted to RMB335,512,000 which represented 23.8% of the Group's total assets.

The Group's inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The net realisable value is determined by management on an individual item basis by taking into account the estimated selling prices of the Group's steel products, the estimated costs of completion of work-in-progress at the reporting date and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

The selling prices of the Group's steel products are mostly affected by the price volatility of raw materials, particularly if the market price of raw materials decline significantly after the reporting date, the net realisable value of the Group's raw materials and finished goods may be less than the cost.

We identified the valuation of inventories as a key audit matter because of its significance to the Group's total assets, and because determining the net realisable value involves significant management judgement and estimation, which can be inherently subjective and increase the risk of error or potential management bias.

How the matter was addressed in our audit

Our audit procedures to assess valuation of inventories included the following:

- obtaining an understanding of and assessing the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of management's key internal controls over inventory management;
- obtaining an understanding of management's basis of estimating the net realisable value and the key judgement involved in estimating the future selling prices of steel products;
- evaluating the calculations made by management in arriving at the net realisable values of the inventories by assessing the reasonableness of the estimated selling price of the steel products with reference to the market price of raw materials and the accuracy of the costs of completion and the selling costs; and
- comparing the carrying values of finished goods, on a sample basis, to their selling prices as indicated in sales invoices subsequent to the reporting date to evaluate management's estimates of net realisable value.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS (CONTINUED)

Loss allowance for trade receivables

Refer to Note 14 to the consolidated financial statements and the accounting policies in Note 2(h)(i).

The Key Audit Matter

At 31 December 2019, the Group's gross trade receivables totalled RMB159,456,000. Loss allowance of RMB648,000 was recorded.

Management measured loss allowance at an amount equal to expected credit losses ("ECLs"). ECLs are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all expected cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive). The ECLs take into account the ageing of trade receivable balances, the repayment history of the Group's customers of different risk characteristics, current market conditions, customer-specific conditions, and the Group's view of economic conditions over the expected lives of the trade receivables.

We identified loss allowance for trade receivables as a key audit matter because determining the level of loss allowance requires the exercise of significant management judgement which is inherently subjective.

How the matter was addressed in our audit

Our audit procedures to assess the loss allowance for trade receivables included the following:

- Obtaining an understanding of and assessing the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of key internal controls over the credit control, the trade receivables collection process and making loss allowances for trade and other receivables;
- Obtaining an understanding on the key data and assumptions of the ECL model adopted by the management, including the historical default data, ageing of trade receivable balances, credit terms, recent settlement patterns and forecast of future economic conditions;
- Assessing the reasonableness of management's estimates on loss allowance by examining the information used by management to form such judgements, including testing the accuracy of the historical default data and evaluating whether the historical loss rates are appropriately adjusted based on current economic conditions and forward-looking information;
- Assessing whether items were correctly categorised in the trade receivables ageing report by comparing a sample of individual items with the relevant underlying documentation; and
- Assessing the disclosures in the consolidated financial statements in relation to the loss allowances for trade receivables with reference to the requirements of the prevailing accounting standards.

INFORMATION OTHER THAN THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND AUDITOR'S REPORT THEREON

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises all the information included in the annual report, other than the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The directors are responsible for the preparation of the consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with IFRSs issued by the IASB and the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The directors are assisted by the Audit Committee in discharging their responsibilities for overseeing the Group's financial reporting process.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. This report is made solely to you, as a body, and for no other purpose. We do not assume responsibility towards or accept liability to any other person for the contents of this report.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with HKSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these consolidated financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with HKSAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

• Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Group's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the directors.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the consolidated financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Group to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Group to express an opinion on the consolidated financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the group audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with the Audit Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide the Audit Committee with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence and communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence and, where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with the Audit Committee, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Expressed in RMB unless otherwise indicated)

1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

KangLi International Holdings Limited (the "Company") was incorporated in the Cayman Islands on 21 December 2017 as an exempted company with limited liability under the Companies Law, Cap 22 (Law 3 of 1961, as consolidated and revised) of the Cayman Islands. The Company's shares were listed on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange") on 19 November 2018 (the "Listing Date"). The Company and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the "Group") are principally engaged in the manufacture and sale of hard steel coil, unpainted galvanised steel products and painted galvanised steel products.

2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all applicable International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs"), which collective term includes all applicable individual International Financial Reporting Standards, International Accounting Standards ("IASs") and Interpretations issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (the "IASB") and the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. These financial statements also comply with the applicable disclosure provisions of the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the Stock Exchange (the "Listing Rules"). Significant accounting policies adopted by the Group are disclosed below.

The IASB has issued certain new and revised IFRSs that are first effective or available for early adoption for the current accounting period of the Group. Note 2(c) provides information on any changes in accounting policies resulting from initial application of these developments to the extent that they are relevant to the Group for the current and prior accounting periods reflected in these financial statements.

(b) Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019 comprise the Group.

The Company was incorporated on 21 December 2017. Prior to the incorporation of the Company, the principal business of the Group has been carried out by Jiangsu Jiangnan Precision Metal Material Co., Limited ("Jiangnan Precision"). Pursuant to a group reorganisation to rationalise the corporate structure in preparation of the listing of the Company's shares on the Stock Exchange which was completed on 5 February 2018 (the "Reorganisation"), the Company became the holding company of the companies now comprising the Group. The Reorganisation only involved inserting of the Company and other newly formed entities with no substantive operations as holding companies of Jiangnan Precision. Jiangnan Precision was controlled by Mr Mei Zefeng before and after the Reorganisation and therefore there were no changes in the economic substance of the ownership and the business of the Group. Accordingly, the Reorganisation has been accounted for using a principle similar to that for a reverse acquisition, with Jiangnan Precision treated as the acquirer for accounting purposes. The consolidated financial statements for the years ended 31 December 2018 have been prepared and presented as a continuation of the consolidated financial statements of Jiangnan Precision with the assets and liabilities of Jiangnan Precision recognised and measured at their historical carrying amounts prior to the Reorganisation.

2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(b) Basis of preparation of the financial statements (Continued)

The measurement basis used in the preparation of the financial statements is the historical cost basis.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRSs requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Judgements made by management in the application of IFRSs that have significant effect on the financial statements and major sources of estimation uncertainty are discussed in Note 3.

(c) Changes in accounting policies

The IASB has issued a new IFRS, IFRS 16, *Leases*, and a number of amendments to IFRSs that are first effective for the current accounting period of the Group.

Except for IFRS 16, *Leases*, none of the developments have had a material effect on how the Group's results and financial position for the current or prior periods have been prepared or presented. The Group has not applied any new standard or interpretation that is not yet effective for the current accounting period.

(c) Changes in accounting policies (Continued)

IFRS 16, Leases

IFRS 16 replaces IAS 17, Leases, and the related interpretations, IFRIC 4, Determining whether an arrangement contains a lease, SIC-15, Operating leases – incentives, and SIC-27, Evaluating the substance of transactions involving the legal form of a lease. It introduces a single accounting model for lessees, which requires a lessee to recognise a right-of-use asset and a lease liability for all leases, except for leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less ("short-term leases") and leases of low-value assets. The lessor accounting requirements are brought forward from IAS 17 substantially unchanged.

IFRS 16 also introduces additional qualitative and quantitative disclosure requirements which aim to enable users of the financial statements to assess the effect that leases have on the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of an entity.

The Group has initially applied IFRS 16 as from 1 January 2019. The Group has elected to use the modified retrospective approach and has therefore recognised the cumulative effect of initial application as an adjustment to the opening balance of equity at 1 January 2019. Comparative information has not been restated and continues to be reported under IAS 17.

Further details of the nature and effect of the changes to previous accounting policies and the transition options applied are set out below:

(i) New definition of a lease

The change in the definition of a lease mainly relates to the concept of control. IFRS 16 defines a lease on the basis of whether a customer controls the use of an identified asset for a period of time, which may be determined by a defined amount of use. Control is conveyed where the customer has both the right to direct the use of the identified asset and to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from that use.

The Group applies the new definition of a lease in IFRS 16 only to contracts that were entered into or changed on or after 1 January 2019. For contracts entered into before 1 January 2019, the Group has used the transitional practical expedient to grandfather the previous assessment of which existing arrangements are or contain leases. Accordingly, contracts that were previously assessed as leases under IAS 17 continue to be accounted for as leases under IFRS 16 and contracts previously assessed as non-lease service arrangements continue to be accounted for as executory contracts.

(c) Changes in accounting policies (Continued)

IFRS 16, Leases (Continued)

(ii) Lessee accounting and transitional impact

IFRS 16 eliminates the requirement for a lessee to classify leases as either operating leases or finance leases, as was previously required by IAS 17. Instead, the Group is required to capitalise all leases when it is the lessee, including leases previously classified as operating leases under IAS 17, other than those short-term leases and leases of low-value assets which are exempted. For an explanation of how the Group applies lessee accounting, see Note 2(g).

At the date of transition to IFRS 16 (i.e. 1 January 2019), the Group determined the length of the remaining lease terms and measured the lease liabilities for the leases previously classified as operating leases at the present value of the remaining lease payments, discounted using the relevant incremental borrowing rates at 1 January 2019. The weighted average of the incremental borrowing rates used for determination of the present value of the remaining lease payments was 4.9%.

(iii) Impact on the financial results and cash flows of the Group

After the initial recognition of right-of-use assets and lease liabilities at 1 January 2019, the Group as a lessee is required to recognise interest expenses accrued on the outstanding balance of the lease liabilities, and the depreciation of the right-of-use assets, instead of the previous policy of recognising rental expenses incurred under operating leases on a straight-line basis over the lease term. This results in a positive impact on the reported profit from operations in the Group's consolidated statement of profit or loss, as compared to the results if IAS 17 had been applied during the year.

In the consolidated cash flow statement, the Group as a lessee is required to split rentals paid under capitalised leases into their capital element and interest element (see Note 16(b)). These elements are classified as financing cash outflows, similar to how leases previously classified as finance leases under IAS 17 were treated, rather than as operating cash outflows, as was the case for operating leases under IAS 17. Although total cash flows are unaffected, the adoption of IFRS 16 therefore results in a change in presentation of cash flows within the consolidated cash flow statement (see Note 16(c)).

The following tables give an indication of the estimated impact of the adoption of IFRS 16 on the Group's financial results and cash flows for the year ended 31 December 2019, by adjusting the amounts reported under IFRS 16 in these consolidated financial statements to compute estimates of the hypothetical amounts that would have been recognised under IAS 17 if this superseded standard had continued to apply in 2019 instead of IFRS 16, and by comparing these hypothetical amounts for 2019 with the actual 2018 corresponding amounts which were prepared under IAS 17.

(d) Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are entities controlled by the Group. The Group controls an entity when it is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. When assessing whether the Group has power, only substantive rights (held by the Group and other parties) are considered.

An investment in a subsidiary is consolidated into the consolidated financial statements from the date that control commences until the date that control ceases. Intra-group balances, transactions and cash flows and any unrealised profits arising from intra-group transactions are eliminated in full in preparing the consolidated financial statements. Unrealised losses resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated in the same way as unrealised gains but only to the extent that there is no evidence of impairment.

In the Company's statement of financial position, an investment in a subsidiary is stated at cost less impairment losses (see Note 2(h)(ii)).

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses (see Note 2(h)(ii)).

The cost of self-constructed items of property, plant and equipment includes the cost of materials, direct labour, the initial estimate, where relevant, of the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located, and an appropriate proportion of production overheads and borrowing costs (see Note 2(t)).

Gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment are determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the item and are recognised in profit or loss on the date of retirement or disposal.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment, less their estimated residual values, if any, using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, the cost of the item is allocated on a reasonable basis between the parts and each part is depreciated separately. Both the useful life of an asset and its residual value, if any, are reviewed annually. Construction in progress is not depreciated until it is completed and ready for its intended use.

(f) Research and development expenditures

Expenditure on research activities is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred. Expenditure on development activities is capitalised if the product or process is technically and commercially feasible and the Group has sufficient resources and the intention to complete development. The expenditure capitalised includes the costs of materials, direct labour, and an appropriate proportion of overheads and borrowing costs (see Note 2(t)), where applicable. Capitalised development costs are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Other development expenditure is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred.

(g) Leased assets

At inception of a contract, the Group assesses whether the contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. Control is conveyed where the customer has both the right to direct the use of the identified asset and to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from that use.

As a lessee

(A) Policy applicable from 1 January 2019

Where the contract contains lease component(s) and non-lease component(s), the Group has elected not to separate non-lease components and accounts for each lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component for all leases.

At the lease commencement date, the Group recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability, except for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. When the Group enters into a lease in respect of a low-value asset, the Group decides whether to capitalise the lease on a lease-by-lease basis. The lease payments associated with those leases which are not capitalised are recognised as an expense on a systematic basis over the lease term.

Where the lease is capitalised, the lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments payable over the lease term, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, using a relevant incremental borrowing rate. After initial recognition, the lease liability is measured at amortised cost and interest expense is calculated using the effective interest method. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or rate are not included in the measurement of the lease liability and hence are charged to profit or loss in the accounting period in which they are incurred.

The right-of-use asset recognised when a lease is capitalised is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability plus any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, and any initial direct costs incurred. Where applicable, the cost of the right-of-use assets also includes an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, discounted to their present value, less any lease incentives received. The right-of-use asset is subsequently stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses (see Note 2(e) and 2(h)(ii)).

The lease liability is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, or there is a change in the Group's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, or there is a change arising from the reassessment of whether the Group will be reasonably certain to exercise a purchase, extension or termination option. When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Group presents right-of-use assets in 'property, plant and equipment' and presents lease liabilities separately in the statement of financial position.

(B) Policy applicable prior to 1 January 2019

In the comparative period, as a lessee the Group classified leases as finance leases if the leases transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the Group. Leases which did not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the Group were classified as operating leases.

Where the Group had the use of assets held under operating leases, payments made under the leases were charged to profit or loss in equal instalments over the accounting periods covered by the lease term, except where an alternative basis was more representative of the pattern of benefits to be derived from the leased asset. Lease incentives received were recognised in profit or loss as an integral part of the aggregate net lease payments made. Contingent rentals were charged to profit or loss in the accounting period in which they were incurred.

(h) Credit losses and impairment of assets

(i) Credit losses from financial instruments and contract assets

The Group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses ("ECLs") on financial assets measured at amortised cost (including cash and cash equivalents, and trade and other receivables) and contract assets.

Measurement of ECLs

ECLs are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all expected cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive).

The expected cash shortfalls for trade and other receivables and contract assets are discounted using the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition or an approximation thereof, where the effect of discounting is material.

The maximum period considered when estimating ECLs is the maximum contractual period over which the Group is exposed to credit risk.

In measuring ECLs, the Group takes into account reasonable and supportable information that is available without undue cost or effort. This includes information about past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

ECLs are measured on either of the following bases:

- 12-month ECLs: these are losses that are expected to result from possible default events within the 12 months after the reporting date; and
- lifetime ECLs: these are losses that are expected to result from all possible default events over the expected lives of the items to which the ECL model applies.

Loss allowances for trade receivables and contract assets are always measured at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs. ECLs on these financial assets are estimated using a provision matrix based on the Group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors and an assessment of both the current and forecast general economic conditions at the reporting date.

(h) Credit losses and impairment of assets (Continued)

(i) Credit losses from financial instruments and contract assets (Continued)

Measurement of ECLs (Continued)

For all other financial instruments, the Group recognises a loss allowance equal to 12-month ECLs unless there has been a significant increase in credit risk of the financial instrument since initial recognition, in which case the loss allowance is measured at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs.

Significant increases in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk of a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of default occurring on the financial instrument assessed at the reporting date with that assessed at the date of initial recognition. In making this reassessment, the Group considers that a default event occurs when the borrower is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Group in full, without recourse by the Group to actions such as realising security (if any is held). The Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition:

- failure to make payments on their contractually due dates;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in a financial instrument's external or internal credit rating (if available);
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor; and
- existing or forecast changes in the market, economic or legal environment that have a significant adverse effect on the debtor's ability to meet its obligation to the Group.

ECLs are remeasured at each reporting date to reflect changes in the financial instrument's credit risk since initial recognition. Any change in the ECL amount is recognised as an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss. The Group recognises an impairment gain or loss for all financial instruments with a corresponding adjustment to their carrying amount through a loss allowance account.

Basis of calculation of interest income

Interest income recognised in accordance with Note 2(r)(ii) is calculated based on the gross carrying amount of the financial asset unless the financial asset is credit-impaired, in which case interest income is calculated based on the amortised cost (i.e. the gross carrying amount less loss allowance) of the financial asset.

At each reporting date, the Group assesses whether a financial asset is credit-impaired. A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred.

(i) Credit losses from financial instruments and contract assets (Continued)

Basis of calculation of interest income (Continued)

Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable events:

- significant financial difficulties of the debtor;
- a breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in payments;
- it becoming probable that the borrower will enter into bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- significant changes in the market, economic or legal environment that have an adverse effect on the debtor.

Write-off policy

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off (either partially or in full) to the extent that there is no realistic prospect of recovery. This is generally the case when the Group determines that the debtor does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off.

Subsequent recoveries of an asset that was previously written off are recognised as a reversal of impairment in profit or loss in the period in which the recovery occurs.

(ii) Impairment of non-current assets

Internal and external sources of information are reviewed at the end of each reporting period to identify indications that the following assets may be impaired or, an impairment loss previously recognised no longer exists or may have decreased:

- property, plant and equipment, including right-of-use assets; and
- investment in a subsidiary in the Company's statement of financial position.

(h) Credit losses and impairment of assets (Continued)

(ii) Impairment of non-current assets (Continued)

If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Calculation of recoverable amount

The recoverable amount of an asset is the greater of its fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. Where an asset does not generate cash inflows largely independent of those from other assets, the recoverable amount is determined for the smallest group of assets that generates cash inflows independently (i.e. a cash-generating unit).

Recognition of impairment losses

An impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss if the carrying amount of an asset, or the cash-generating unit to which it belongs, exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses recognised in respect of cash-generating units are allocated to reduce the carrying amount of the assets in the unit (or group of units) on a pro rata basis, except that the carrying value of an asset will not be reduced below its individual fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable) or value in use (if determinable).

Reversals of impairment losses

An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a favourable change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount.

A reversal of an impairment loss is limited to the asset's carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised in prior years. Reversals of impairment losses are credited to profit or loss in the year in which the reversals are recognised.

(iii) Interim financial reporting and impairment

Under the Listing Rules, the Group is required to prepare an interim financial report in compliance with IAS 34, *Interim financial reporting*, in respect of the first six months of the financial year. At the end of the interim period, the Group applies the same impairment testing, recognition, and reversal criteria as it would at the end of the financial year (see Note 2(h)(i)).

(i) Inventories and other contract costs

(i) Inventories

Inventories are assets which are held for sale in the ordinary course of business, in the process of production for such sale or in the form of materials or supplies to be consumed in the production process.

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Cost is calculated using the weighted average cost formula and comprises all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

When inventories are sold, the carrying amount of those inventories is recognised as an expense in the period in which the related revenue is recognised. The amount of any write-down of inventories to net realisable value and all losses of inventories are recognised as an expense in the period the write-down or loss occurs. The amount of any reversal of any write-down of inventories is recognised as a reduction in the amount of inventories recognised as an expense in the period in which the reversal occurs.

(ii) Other contract costs

Other contract costs are either the incremental costs of obtaining a contract with a customer or the costs to fulfil a contract with a customer which are not capitalised as inventories (see Note 2(i)(i)).

Incremental costs of obtaining a contract are those costs that the Group incurs to obtain a contract with a customer that it would not have incurred if the contract had not been obtained e.g. an incremental sales commission. Incremental costs of obtaining a contract are capitalised when incurred if the costs relate to revenue which will be recognised in a future reporting period and the costs are expected to be recovered. Other costs of obtaining a contract are expensed when incurred.

Costs to fulfil a contract are capitalised if the costs relate directly to an existing contract or to a specifically identifiable anticipated contract; generate or enhance resources that will be used to provide goods or services in the future; and are expected to be recovered. Costs that relate directly to an existing contract or to a specifically identifiable anticipated contract may include direct labour, direct materials, allocations of costs, costs that are explicitly chargeable to the customer and other costs that are incurred only because the Group entered into the contract (for example, payments to sub-contractors). Other costs of fulfilling a contract, which are not capitalised as inventories, are expensed as incurred.

(i) Inventories and other contract costs (Continued)

(ii) Other contract costs (Continued)

Capitalised contract costs are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Impairment losses are recognised to the extent that the carrying amount of the contract cost asset exceeds the net of (i) remaining amount of consideration that the Group expects to receive in exchange for the goods to which the asset relates, less (ii) any costs that relate directly to providing those goods or services that have not yet been recognised as expenses.

Amortisation of capitalised contract costs is charged to profit or loss when the revenue to which the asset relates is recognised. The accounting policy for revenue recognition is set out in Note 2(r).

(j) Contract assets and contract liabilities

A contract asset is recognised when the Group recognises revenue (see Note 2(r)) before being unconditionally entitled to the consideration under the payment terms set out in the contract. Contract assets are assessed for ECLs in accordance with the policy set out in Note 2(h)(i) and are reclassified to receivables when the right to the consideration has become unconditional (see Note 2(k)).

A contract liability is recognised when the customer pays consideration before the Group recognises the related revenue (see Note 2(r)). A contract liability would also be recognised if the Group has an unconditional right to receive consideration before the Group recognises the related revenue. In such cases, a corresponding receivable would also be recognised (see Note 2(k)).

For a single contract with the customer, either a net contract asset or a net contract liability is presented. For multiple contracts, contract assets and contract liabilities of unrelated contracts are not presented on a net basis.

(k) Trade and other receivables

A receivable is recognised when the Group has an unconditional right to receive consideration. A right to receive consideration is unconditional if only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due. If revenue has been recognised before the Group has an unconditional right to receive consideration, the amount is presented as a contract asset (see Note 2(j)).

Receivables are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less allowance for credit losses (see Note 2(h)(i)).

(I) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other financial institutions, and short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Cash and cash equivalents are assessed for ECLs in accordance with the policy set out in Note 2(h)(i).

(m) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are initially recognised at fair value. Trade and other payables are subsequently stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

(n) Interest-bearing borrowings

Interest-bearing borrowings are measured initially at fair value less transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, interest-bearing borrowings are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense is recognised in accordance with the Group's accounting policy for borrowing costs (see Note 2(t)).

(o) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefits and contributions to defined contribution retirement plans

Salaries, annual bonuses, paid annual leave, contributions to defined contribution retirement plans and the cost of non-monetary benefits are accrued in the year in which the associated services are rendered by employees. Where payment or settlement is deferred and the effect would be material, these amounts are stated at their present values.

(ii) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are recognised at the earlier of when the Group can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits and when it recognises restructuring costs involving the payment of termination benefits

(p) Income tax

Income tax for the year comprises current tax and movements in deferred tax assets and liabilities. Current tax and movements in deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that they relate to business combinations, items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case the relevant amounts of tax are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the end of the reporting period, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities arise from deductible and taxable temporary differences respectively, being the differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and their tax bases. Deferred tax assets also arise from unused tax losses and unused tax credits.

Apart from certain limited exceptions, all deferred tax liabilities, and all deferred tax assets to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the asset can be utilised, are recognised. Future taxable profits that may support the recognition of deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences include those that will arise from the reversal of existing taxable temporary differences, provided those differences relate to the same taxation authority and the same taxable entity, and are expected to reverse either in the same period as the expected reversal of the deductible temporary difference or in periods into which a tax loss arising from the deferred tax asset can be carried back or forward. The same criteria are adopted when determining whether existing taxable temporary differences support the recognition of deferred tax assets arising from unused tax losses and credits, that is, those differences are taken into account if they relate to the same taxation authority and the same taxable entity, and are expected to reverse in a period, or periods, in which the tax loss or credit can be utilised.

(p) Income tax (Continued)

The limited exceptions to recognition of deferred tax assets and liabilities are those temporary differences arising from the initial recognition of assets or liabilities that affect neither accounting nor taxable profit (provided that they are not part of a business combination), and temporary differences relating to investments in subsidiaries to the extent that, in the case of taxable differences, the Group controls the timing of reversal and it is probable that the differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future, or in the case of deductible differences, unless it is probable that they will reverse in the future.

The amount of deferred tax recognised is measured based on the expected manner of realisation or settlement of the carrying amount of the assets and liabilities, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the end of the reporting period. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and is reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow the related tax benefit to be utilised. Any such reduction is reversed to the extent that it becomes probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available.

Current tax balances and deferred tax balances, and movements therein, are presented separately from each other and are not offset. Current tax assets are offset against current tax liabilities, and deferred tax assets against deferred tax liabilities, if the Company or the Group has the legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the following additional conditions are met:

- in the case of current tax assets and liabilities, the Company or the Group intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously; or
- in the case of deferred tax assets and liabilities, if they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either:
 - the same taxable entity; or
 - different taxable entities, which, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered, intend to realise the current tax assets and settle the current tax liabilities on a net basis or realise and settle simultaneously.

(q) Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a legal or constructive obligation arising as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made. Where the time value of money is material, provisions are stated at the present value of the expenditure expected to settle the obligation.

Where it is not probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required, or the amount cannot be estimated reliably, the obligation is disclosed as a contingent liability, unless the probability of outflow of economic benefits is remote. Possible obligations, whose existence will only be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more future events are also disclosed as contingent liabilities unless the probability of outflow of economic benefits is remote.

(r) Revenue and other income

Income is classified by the Group as revenue when it arises from the sale of goods in the ordinary course of the Group's business.

Revenue is recognised when control over a product is transferred to the customer at the amount of promised consideration to which the Group is expected to be entitled, excluding those amounts collected on behalf of third parties. Revenue excludes value added tax or other sales taxes and is after deduction of any trade discounts.

Further details of the Group's revenue and other income recognition policies are as follows:

(i) Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised when the customer takes possession of and accepts the products. If the products are a partial fulfilment of a contract covering other goods, then the amount of revenue recognised is an appropriate proportion of the total transaction price under the contract, allocated between all the goods promised under the contract on a relative stand-alone selling price basis.

(ii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised as it accrues using the effective interest method. For financial assets measured at amortised cost that are not credit-impaired, the effective interest rate is applied to the gross carrying amount of the asset. For credit impaired financial assets, the effective interest rate is applied to the amortised cost (i.e. gross carrying amount net of loss allowance) of the asset (see Note 2(h)(i)).

(iii) Government grants

Government grants are recognised in the statement of financial position initially when there is reasonable assurance that they will be received and that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them. Grants that compensate the Group for expenses incurred are recognised as other income in profit or loss on a systematic basis in the same periods in which the expenses are incurred. Grants that compensate the Group for the cost of an asset are recognised as deferred income and consequently recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the useful life of the asset.

(s) Translation of foreign currencies

Foreign currency transactions during the year are translated at the foreign exchange rates ruling at the transaction dates. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the foreign exchange rates ruling at the end of the reporting period. Exchange gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the foreign exchange rates ruling at the transaction dates. The transaction date is the date on which the Group initially recognises such non-monetary assets or liabilities.

The results of foreign operations are translated into RMB, the Group's presentation currency, at the exchange rates approximating the foreign exchange rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Statement of financial position items are translated into RMB at the closing foreign exchange rates at the end of the reporting period. The resulting exchange differences are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated separately in equity in the exchange reserve.

(t) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset which necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset. Other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

The capitalisation of borrowing costs as part of the cost of a qualifying asset commences when expenditure for the asset is being incurred, borrowing costs are being incurred and activities that are necessary to prepare the asset for its intended use or sale are in progress. Capitalisation of borrowing costs is suspended or ceases when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying asset for its intended use or sale are interrupted or complete.

(u) Related parties

- (a) A person, or a close member of that person's family, is related to the Group if that person:
 - (i) has control or joint control over the Group;
 - (ii) has significant influence over the Group; or
 - (iii) is a member of the key management personnel of the Group or of the Group's parent.

(u) Related parties (Continued)

- (b) An entity is related to the Group if any of the following conditions applies:
 - (i) the entity and the Group are members of the same group.
 - (ii) one entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or an associate or joint venture of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
 - (iii) both entities are joint ventures of the same third party.
 - (iv) one entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
 - (v) the entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Group or an entity related to the Group.
 - (vi) the entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (a).
 - (vii) a person identified in (a)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity).
 - (viii) the entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the Group or to the Group's parent.

Close members of the family of a person are those family members who may be expected to influence, or be influenced by, that person in their dealings with the entity.

(v) Segment reporting

Operating segments, and the amounts of each segment item reported in the financial statements, are identified from the financial information provided regularly to the Group's most senior executive management for the purposes of allocating resources to, and assessing the performance of, the Group's various lines of business and geographical locations.

Individually material operating segments are not aggregated for financial reporting purposes unless the segments have similar economic characteristics and are similar in respect of the nature of products, the nature of production processes, the type or class of customers, the methods used to distribute the products, and the nature of the regulatory environment. Operating segments which are not individually material may be aggregated if they share a majority of these criteria.

3 ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The significant sources of estimation uncertainty are as follows:

(a) Impairment losses for non-current assets

If circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of a non-current asset may not be recoverable, the asset may be considered "impaired", and an impairment loss may be recognised in accordance with accounting policy for impairment of non-current assets as described in Note 2(h)(ii). When such a decline has occurred, the carrying amount is reduced to recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. In determining the value in use, expected future cash flows generated by the asset are discounted to their present value, which requires significant judgement relating to the level of revenue and amount of operating costs. The Group uses all readily available information in determining an amount that is a reasonable approximation of the recoverable amount, including estimates based on reasonable and supportable assumptions and projections of the level of revenue and amount of operating costs. Changes in these estimates could have a significant impact on the recoverable amount of the asset and could result in additional impairment charge or reversal of impairment in future periods.

(b) Expected credit loss for receivables

The credit loss allowances for trade and other receivables are based on assumptions about the expected loss rates. The Group uses judgements in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on the Group's past collection history, existing market conditions as well as forward looking estimates at the end of each reporting period. Changes in these assumptions and estimates could materially affect the result of the assessment and it may be necessary to make additional impairment charge to profit or loss.

(c) Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated over the estimated useful lives of the assets, after taking into account the estimated residual values, if any. The management of the Group reviews the estimated useful lives and residual values, if any, of the property, plant and equipment regularly in order to determine the amount of depreciation expenses to be recorded during any reporting period. The determination of the useful lives and residual values, if any, are based on historical experience with similar assets and taking into account anticipated changes on how such assets are to be deployed. The depreciation expense for future periods is adjusted if there are significant changes from previous estimates.

(d) Determining the lease term

As explained in policy Note 2(g), the lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments payable over the lease term. In determining the lease term at the commencement date for leases that include renewal options exercisable by the Group, the Group evaluates the likelihood of exercising the renewal options taking into account all relevant facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive for the Group to exercise the option, including favourable terms, leasehold improvements undertaken and the importance of that underlying asset to the Group's operations. The lease term is reassessed when there is a significant event or significant change in circumstance that is within the Group's control. Any increase or decrease in the lease term would affect the amount of lease liabilities and right-of-use assets recognised in future years.

The Group is principally engaged in the manufacture and sale of hard steel coil, unpainted galvanised steel products and painted galvanised steel products. Further details regarding the Group's principal activities are disclosed in Note 4(b).

Immediately following the acquisition, Jiangnan Precision became an indirectly wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company. (f) Capital reserve

In accordance with the relevant PRC laws and regulations, the Company's subsidiary established in Mainland China is required to transfer 10% of its net profit to the statutory reserve until the reserve balance reaches 50% of the subsidiary's registered capital. The transfer to this reserve must be made before distributions to equity holders. This reserve can be utilised in setting off accumulated losses or increase capital of the subsidiary and is non-distributable other than in liquidation.

(h) Exchange reserve

The exchange reserve comprises all foreign exchange differences arising from the translation of the financial statements of foreign operations. The reserve is dealt with in accordance with the accounting policies set out in Note 2(s).

(i) Capital management

The Group's primary objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, so that it can continue to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders, by pricing products and services commensurately with the level of risk and by securing access to finance at a reasonable cost.

The Group actively and regularly reviews and manages its capital structure to maintain a balance between the higher shareholder returns that might be possible with higher levels of borrowings and the advantages and security afforded by a sound capital position, and makes adjustments to the capital structure in light of changes in economic conditions.

Neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries are subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

Exposure to credit, liquidity, interest rate and currency risks arises in the normal course of the Group's business.

The Group's exposure to these risks and the financial risk management policies and practices used by the Group to manage these risks are described below.

(a) Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss to the Group. The Group's credit risk is primarily attributable to trade and other receivables. The Group's exposure to credit risk arising from cash and cash equivalents and bills receivables is limited because the counterparties are banks and financial institutions with high credit standings, for which the Group considers to have low credit risk.

The Group does not provide any guarantees which would expose the Group to credit risk.

Trade receivables

The Group's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each customer rather than the industry in which the customers operate and therefore significant concentrations of credit risk primarily arise when the Group has significant exposure to individual customers. At the end of the reporting period, 8.7% (2018: 5.6%) and 22.8% (2018: 14.7%) of the total trade and bills receivables was due from the Group's largest debtor and the five largest debtors, respectively.

Individual credit evaluations are performed on all customers requiring credit over a certain amount. These evaluations focus on the customer's past history of making payments when due and current ability to pay, and take into account information specific to the customer as well as pertaining to the economic environment in which the customer operates. Trade receivables are due within 30 to 90 days from the date of billing. Normally, the Group does not obtain collateral from customers.

The Group measures loss allowances for trade receivables at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs, which is calculated using a provision matrix. As the Group's historical credit loss experience does not indicate significantly different loss patterns for different customer segments, the loss allowance based on past due status is not further distinguished between the Group's different customer bases.

27 NON-ADJUSTING EVENT AFTER THE REPORTING PERIOD

Impact from the COVID-19 pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic since early 2020 has brought about additional uncertainties in the Group's operating environment and may impact the Group's operations and financial position.

The Group has been closely monitoring the impact of the developments on the Group's businesses and has put in place certain contingency measures. The directors of the Company confirm that these contingency measures include but not limited to reassessing the fluctuation (if any) to the demand and selling price of the Group's steel products in light of the fluctuations in the purchase prices of raw materials, reassessing the sustainability of existing suppliers and/or expanding the supplier base of raw materials in ensuring the Group is able to meet customers' demands, negotiating with customers on possible delay in delivery timetables, improving the Group's cash management by expediting debtor settlements, and negotiating with suppliers an extension of payment terms. The Group will keep the contingency measures under review as the COVID-19 pandemic situation evolves.

As far as the Group's businesses are concerned, the COVID-19 pandemic may cause production and delivery delays of the Group's steel products, but the directors of the Company consider that such impact is temporary and could be reduced by expediting production upon cessation of the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic may also significantly impact the demand of the Group's steel products which in turn may result in the decrease in sales of such products, and hence the profitability of the Group's operations and the potential impairment of the Group's production facilities in future periods. Such possible decrease in the demand of the Group's products may be a result of the customers' deteriorating operations which may increase the impairment risks of related debtors in future periods. These possible impacts have not been reflected in the Group's consolidated financial statements as of 31 December 2019, and the actual impacts may differ from these estimates as the COVID-19 pandemic situation continues to evolve and when further information may become available.

Newrich Limited does not produce financial statements available for public use.
